1 MR. SMITH: Adequate notice of this  
2 meeting has been provided, as required by law, by  
3 mailing to the Press a copy of the regularly  
4 scheduled meetings of the Board of Directors,  
5 including a notice of the regular meeting scheduled  
6 for August 20, 2014, at 401 North Virginia Avenue,  
7 conference room, Atlantic City, New Jersey. Copy of  
8 said notice was sent to city clerk to be posted. All  
9 of the aforesaid complies with Chapter 231 of the  
10 laws of 1975, known as open public meeting laws.

11 Roll call?

12 MR. BOR: Mr. Lea?

13 MR. LEA: Here.

14 MR. BOR: Colanzi? McGettigan?

15 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Here.

16 MR. BOR: Hill?

17 MR. HILL: Here.

18 MR. BOR: Smith?

19 MR. SMITH: Here.

20 MR. BOR: Minutes have been made  
21 available for the July 16th Board meeting. I take it  
22 the Members have had a chance to review?

23 MR. WARD: I had a correction on just  
24 an indication on page two, box seven, down at the  
25 bottom, the statement, "and in Closed Session I'll

1 discuss my discussions with the labor unit. I went  
2 up to the headquarters." Actually, that statement  
3 was Mr. Weber's statement, so I made the notation to  
4 our stenographer. It's just a designation of who was  
5 in fact the real speaker.

6 MR. HILL: Move to approve.

7 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Second.

8 MR. BOR: Mr. Lea?

9 MR. LEA: Yes.

10 MR. BOR: McGettigan?

11 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Yes.

12 MR. BOR: Hill?

13 MR. HILL: Yes.

14 MR. BOR: Smith?

15 MR. SMITH: Yes.

16 MR. BOR: Carries.

17 MR. WARD: Mr. Chairman, we have guest  
18 here to discuss the American Demolition matter. Did  
19 you want to bring the gentlemen in?

20 MR. SMITH: Yes, let's bring the  
21 gentlemen in.

22 MR. WARD: Good morning, gentlemen.

23 MR. LEVENSON: Sit back here?

24 MR. WARD: You can actually pull up.  
25 We had an outstanding matter with

1 regard to American Demolition Corporation, which  
2 proceeded with letters back and forth between a Lewis  
3 Schweller and then a call directly to me from  
4 Mr. Levenson, asking for an opportunity to review, so  
5 Mr. Levenson and I had a discussion yesterday. I  
6 invited him to come in to bring his client to see  
7 what the course of a resolution of an outstanding  
8 meter could be, and if we could hear their statement,  
9 then this matter can go into Closed Session and we  
10 can figure out if there is -- what direction the  
11 Authority needs to go.

12 MR. LEVENSON: Thank you, everyone, for  
13 hearing us on such short notice. Even though this  
14 dispute basically goes back to 1999, so but --

15 MR. SMITH: 15 years?

16 MR. LEVENSON: Yes, 15 years. I just  
17 want to lay a little bit of the groundwork here so  
18 that you don't think that I picked up this guy as a  
19 client on the way here.

20 Bernard has had this company, American  
21 Demolition, for a couple decades and I met him when  
22 my wife, who is an attorney, was an attorney for CRDA  
23 for the Northeast Redevelopment Project in the Inlet.  
24 And at that time Bernard was the contractor that was  
25 hired by CRDA to do all the demolition work. And I

1 have two sons, who are 22 and 23 right now, but when  
2 they were four and five, I took them over to see what  
3 Bernard was doing, and Bernard, but the statute of  
4 limitations was over, but Bernard took the kids up in  
5 the bulldozers, and to this day, my kids remember  
6 going up there and pulling the levers of these giant  
7 bulldozers, so I just want to make that clear that's  
8 how long I've known Bernard and he is a class act, as  
9 any class act is.

10 And so when he came to see me and he  
11 told me of this dispute, you know, I talked to Bruce  
12 and I said, you know, we would like to resolve this,  
13 but when you hear -- hopefully when the Board Members  
14 hear the facts of what happened, and Bernard will  
15 tell you, you will see basically there really  
16 shouldn't be anything owed to the Authority, and  
17 actually Bernard is working with the Authority now on  
18 some ongoing matters where you are actually using him  
19 for concrete that he has in his business, in order  
20 for you to do work.

21 So this is an ongoing relationship. We  
22 expect it to be an ongoing relationship, not only  
23 when he needs water for his demolition, but also when  
24 you need concrete and whatever. So the past  
25 hopefully will be the past and the future hopefully

1 will be bright.

2 So Bernard, why don't you start by just  
3 briefly telling everybody when this started and when  
4 it sort of ended, and the facts that comprise that  
5 time period.

6 MR. STYER: Good morning, everyone. It  
7 was the late '90s that the -- that we obtained a  
8 meter from ACMUA, which was a \$500 security deposit.  
9 We got the meter. The meter was used sporadically on  
10 demo jobs. We would hook it on to go to the three  
11 inch meter, go to a fire hose, so that was our source  
12 for water controlling the dust on all demolition,  
13 which is required by the City.

14 MR. LEVENSON: Not all demolition jobs.

15 MR. STYER: On the demolition jobs I  
16 did, we always had dust control, so through the years  
17 we would use it. Things got slow. I didn't do so  
18 much work in Atlantic City. The meter went on the  
19 shelf in the shop. Time went by. The meter wasn't  
20 read. It wasn't used. It was kind of put on the  
21 shelf.

22 In 2008, I believe it was, we were  
23 doing a fire emergency job on Illinois Avenue, and  
24 one of the ACMUA personnel came by, and he was quite  
25 adamant that he needed to take the meter. He took

1 the meter. Short time after that I got a bill for  
2 \$51,800 from ACMUA for rental for the meter.

3 To my recollection, it wasn't a rental.  
4 We had no rental agreement in place. It was a  
5 security deposit for the meter and you paid for the  
6 consumption.

7 Neil Goldfine I believe was the  
8 Executive Director, so this has been going 15, 16  
9 years, but those first ten years was dormant. There  
10 was no communication, there was no nothing. It was  
11 just, you know, I had the meter, never got a bill, no  
12 communication, no letters, no calls, no anything from  
13 ACMUA about a meter reading, meter use or any of  
14 that.

15 MR. HILL: So you didn't use the meter  
16 these ten years?

17 MR. STYER: I went back and I pulled  
18 all the files of all the jobs that I did over those  
19 ten years, and we actually did a calculation of how  
20 many days we actually used the meter. Because after  
21 Neil Goldfine, there was a Lisa Mosby --

22 MS. BAZEMORE: Karen Mosby.

23 MR. STYER: I believe she's under  
24 Mr. Ward said, Well, look, it's on the books. We  
25 want to get this resolved. Let's deal with it. Go

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 back in your file. How many jobs did you do? How  
2 many days did you have it? And hopefully it's cut  
3 and dry. So that's where we are.

4 MR. LEVENSON: You actually submitted a  
5 document, which was your best estimation of the  
6 number of jobs that you did per year, and what you  
7 would owe as a result of that, correct?

8 MR. STYER: The consumption.

9 MR. LEVENSON: \$689.29.

10 MS. BAZEMORE: That analysis, I put  
11 that together, but it is based on information he  
12 provided.

13 MR. LEVENSON: He, obviously, he's the  
14 best one to know when he used the water. And so  
15 that's what -- and so one thing that he did leave  
16 out, in full transparency, when they took the meter,  
17 it was determined there was something broken on the  
18 meter, right?

19 MR. STYER: I was told that the  
20 mechanics inside the dial that turns the dial for the  
21 meter reading was not operable.

22 MS. BAZEMORE: At the time you took the  
23 meter?

24 MR. STYER: No, when it was returned.  
25 So I was told there was no way to really calculate,

1 because there was no previous record of what the  
2 meter read when the meter was taken, so we have  
3 nothing to base it on, so that's why we went back,  
4 along with the other reasons.

5 MR. SMITH: You're saying you estimated  
6 -- what was the last bill you paid to MUA prior to  
7 the meter going down, or prior to the meter being  
8 used? What kind of bills was he submitting?

9 MR. STYER: I wasn't getting any bills.

10 MR. SMITH: You didn't pay the MUA any  
11 money?

12 MR. STYER: I didn't get any bills.  
13 There was no communication, no calls, no nothing.  
14 Ten years go by, then the meter gets pulled off of  
15 the job and then I get the bill for 55,000, which  
16 I've done some homework with other contractors and  
17 they have told me that the procedure where the meters  
18 were taken out with the security deposit, at some  
19 point that was changed. Those meters were returned,  
20 new agreements were signed and if you taken the  
21 meter, you're paying so much per day. That's what I  
22 feel -- I don't feel I should be punished. I wasn't  
23 informed. Nobody let me know.

24 If I knew there was a daily rate for  
25 the meter, I would have certainly brought it back

1       instead of having it sitting on my shelf, but it was  
2       kind of one of those things.

3                   MR. SMITH:   You had no written  
4       agreement, in essence?

5                   MR. STYER:   No.   Back in the day it was  
6       the \$500 security deposit and you took the meter and  
7       you pay for the consumption.

8                   MR. SMITH:   Garth, are you familiar  
9       with this?

10                  MR. MOYLE:   '99, you think it's your  
11       meter and you sit it on your shelf and you think it  
12       was yours.

13                  MR. STYER:   That's what the \$500  
14       security deposit was.   You have the money for the  
15       meter.

16                  MS. BAZEMORE:   The policy has changed  
17       somewhat, but I'm sure it would have been some type  
18       of documentation back then.

19                  MR. SMITH:   Does the record show that  
20       we got a \$500 deposit?

21                  MS. BAZEMORE:   I was not able to find  
22       any documentation, but I'm certain it would have been  
23       some type of document he would have had to sign.

24                  MR. HILL:   Maybe he has it?

25                  MR. STYER:   On the \$55,000 bill, it

1 does reflect the \$500 less deposit.

2 MR. SMITH: Okay. The Board will take  
3 it under advisement, and what we can give you, I  
4 guess, we should do it in Closed Session. We'll come  
5 up with our decision.

6 MR. STYER: Just for the record, I'm  
7 not saying that I didn't have the meter, I had the  
8 meter. I'm the kind of guy that's doing the right  
9 thing.

10 MR. SMITH: We're still doing business  
11 with you, so we like you.

12 MR. LEVENSON: They like you.

13 MR. MOYLE: And there is plenty of  
14 business for you in this town.

15 MR. LEVENSON: Hopefully we are not  
16 going to be demolishing these three casinos.

17 MS. BAZEMORE: We started providing the  
18 meter, and you had a job down that end of the town.  
19 We provided a meter for --

20 MR. STYER: That might have been the  
21 fire emergency job on -- yeah, we did get a meter for  
22 that, but since the meter was pulled, the other jobs  
23 I did in town, I would bring my own water in a tank,  
24 which is not the most easiest thing. It's so much  
25 easier --

1 MS. BAZEMORE: Your attorney, we agree,  
2 we will continue to do business since we are trying  
3 to resolve this.

4 MR. STYER: We're on the right path.  
5 I'm not denying anything. I want to move forward.

6 MR. SMITH: One other thing. Are we  
7 going to resolve this today?

8 MR. HILL: We'll look at it.

9 MR. WARD: We're going to go into  
10 Closed Session and the Board can give us advisement,  
11 which may require our billing and our systems to do  
12 even further research and come back, so we could  
13 resolve it today, but perhaps we need --

14 MR. SMITH: I don't want to hold these  
15 guys up.

16 MR. WARD: No, they're done for the  
17 day. We wanted to hear their side.

18 MR. SMITH: Thanks, guys.

19 MR. LEVENSON: If you are going to go  
20 into Closed Session, should we wait around in case  
21 you have another question for us?

22 MR. HILL: No, it's going to be a  
23 while. We could always call you if we need to.

24 MR. SMITH: I was wondering what we do  
25 about Ed? It's going to be -- is he going to be

1 available? He said he's going to need to be  
2 available.

3 MR. WARD: Ed, is going to need to be  
4 available by phone.

5 MR. SMITH: For Closed Session?

6 MR. WARD: Actually it's Open Session

8 MR. BOR: That's a resolution.

9 MR. WARD: I don't know that we need  
10 him for this, I don't know.

11 MR. SMITH: I got you.

12 MR. HILL: No, unh-unh.

13 MS. JOHNSON: So do we need Ed now?

14 MR. WARD: You can give him a call now,  
15 if he's available.

16 MS. JOHNSON: He's on the line. He was  
17 lying down. He's on the line outside.

18 MR. WARD: We'll bring him in here.  
19 Have that call transferred here on speaker.

20 MR. SMITH: Get that resolved.

21 MR. WARD: Borgata connection fee  
22 lawsuit is three in Executive Session.

23 MR. HILL: We don't have three now.

24 MR. BOR: Nor do we have a copy of the  
25 agreement. Oh, here. Here it is.

1 MR. WARD: Do you have the agreement?

2 MR. BOR: No, no, this is Ventnor's.

3 MR. MCGETTIGAN: This is for Executive  
4 Session?

5 MR. HILL: Right, there is no agreement  
6 here.

7 MR. WARD: We agreed on -- Fred, we  
8 agreed on our discussion, we agreed on the monetary  
9 piece. Did you prepare the agreement?

10 MR. BOR: Yes, I sent it to you and you  
11 sent it off to Stella to make copies for the Board  
12 Members, the actual file, the agreement to be  
13 reviewed.

14 (Mr. Colanzi present telephonically.)

15 MS. JOHNSON: Ed, can you hear us?

16 MR. COLANZI: Yes.

17 MR. WARD: Good morning, Ed, can you  
18 hear us?

19 MR. COLANZI: I'm here.

20 MR. WARD: Ed, we have --

21 MR. HILL: I make a motion to go into  
22 Closed Session. Can we go into Closed Session first?

23 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Second.

24 MR. HILL: To go to Closed Session.  
25 It's not in public.

1 MR. SMITH: We will. We're going into  
2 Closed Session.

3 MR. BOR: Any motion to go into Closed  
4 Session?

5 Mr. Lea?

6 MR. LEA: Yes.

7 MR. BOR: Colanzi?

8 MR. COLANZI: Yes.

9 MR. BOR: McGettigan?

10 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Yes.

11 MR. BOR: Hill?

12 MR. HILL: Yes.

13 MR. BOR: Smith?

14 MR. SMITH: Yes.

15 (Closed Session from  
16 10:25 a.m. to 10:30 a.m.)

17 MR. HILL: Make a motion to move from  
18 Closed Session to Open Session.

19 MR. SMITH: Second.

20 MR. BOR: Hearing no objection, we're  
21 now back in Open Session.

22 And I believe there is a motion to  
23 consider before the Board, to approve the Borgata  
24 settlement per the agreement that's been negotiated  
25 between Borgata and the ACMUA in terms which have

2                   MR. COLANZI:  Yes.

3                   MR. SMITH:  Move it.  Move it.

4                   MR. BOR:  Is there a second, Mr. Lea?

5                   MR. LEA:  Second.

6                   MR. BOR:  Mr. Lea?

7                   MR. LEA:  Yes.

8                   MR. BOR:  Mr. Colanzi?

9                   MR. COLANZI:  Yes.

10                  MR. BOR:  And Mr. Smith?

11                  MR. SMITH:  Yes.

12                  MR. BOR:  Motion carries.  Rest well,  
13       Ed.  We'll talk to you later.

14                  MR. SMITH:  Take care of yourself, Ed.  
15       We'll talk to you later.

16                  MR. WARD:  We are back in Open Session,  
17       and we have some correspondence, number 4 a (1) is  
18       the Marty Wilson 8th Annual Harvest Brunch, as you  
19       know, September the 28th.  I have been frequently  
20       going to all of these even before coming onto the  
21       ACMUA, so I will be there.  They are requesting five  
22       cases of water, so we'll take care of that.

23                  We also had a request for the Wonder  
24       Bar car wash.  The Wonder Bar, at the foot of the  
25       bridge on Route 40, had a bikini car wash, which was

1 on August the 7th, and it was to benefit the  
2 Salvation Army Day Camp of Atlantic City. The  
3 request was for the use of a fire hydrant hose. And  
4 I spoke with Board President. Board President  
5 approved.

6 Next we have the Atlantic City Jitney  
7 Association and this was a solicitation to  
8 participate in a golf scholarship tournament.

9 MR. BOR: Ed calling me, excuse me.

10 MR. WARD: I'm not a golfer at all.

11 MR. HILL: Neither am I.

12 MR. WARD: I did not respond to that.

13 Two other requests came in by  
14 telephone. One was a telephone call from Mr. Seymour  
15 Pinky Kravitz for water for the Armed Forces parade,  
16 which we did supply them with, I believe it was ten  
17 cases for the Armed Forces parade.

18 We got a second call this week from,  
19 he's the director of Intercultural Affairs for the  
20 City of Atlantic City, and his name is escaping me  
21 but --

22 MR. HILL: Jay Soto.

23 MR. WARD: Yes, thank you, Mr. Hill,  
24 Jay Soto.

25 There is an India parade this weekend.

1 I'm not sure if it's the India parade or the  
2 Bangladesh ceremony, which is going to be at Bader  
3 Field and they've requested water also.

4 MR. SMITH: How much water?

5 MR. WARD: 40 cases.

6 MR. SMITH: This is getting out of hand  
7 and again we're not getting --

8 MR. HILL: Give them ten, the same as  
9 we did for the Armed Forces.

10 MR. SMITH: Ten to 15.

11 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Maybe we come up with  
12 a standard, that --

13 MR. SMITH: 20 at the most.

14 MR. HILL: I agree.

15 MR. SMITH: It's getting out of hand,  
16 but go ahead, Bruce.

17 MR. WARD: Well, if you want me to, I  
18 can drop -- they're supposed to pick up tomorrow.  
19 We've already gone to Sam's and purchased the water  
20 and brought it in.

21 MR. HILL: Maybe we should put a policy  
22 or standards for the future.

23 MR. SMITH: If you already committed,  
24 we'll honor that.

25 MR. WARD: We'll talk about a policy

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 that recognizes what's the number of people and the  
2 weather and all that.

3 MR. SMITH: But the ones we handle here  
4 in the City, that like the boardwalk one for our  
5 councilman, we should allow them whatever they need,  
6 but these outside organizations, we got to slow the  
7 roll, that's all.

8 MR. HILL: Yes.

9 MR. WARD: Okay. Financial report, Ms.  
10 Bazemore?

11 MS. BAZEMORE: A few things. We did an  
12 analysis of Revel's income, assuming that they close  
13 in September. The impact to the Authority would be  
14 about \$322,000. That's the annual number that would  
15 impact our budget. Hopefully, if they do go offline,  
16 it will be for a short period of time and we won't  
17 realize that type of detriment.

18 MR. WARD: Ms. Bazemore, what would be  
19 the cumulative cash loss if the four casinos that  
20 have either closed or are slated to closing down,  
21 what's the total?

22 MS. BAZEMORE: It's \$1.3 million in  
23 total for all four properties.

24 MR. SMITH: 1.3?

25 MR. MCGETTIGAN: 1.3?

1 MR. SMITH: Are we still going to be  
2 able to function?

3 MS. BAZEMORE: We're in budget season  
4 next month. Once we put all the numbers together,  
5 we'll know what's happening and where our rates need  
6 to go and what our future holds as far as expenses  
7 and so forth.

8 MR. WARD: We've had a number of  
9 capital budget meetings following the operations  
10 meeting, with the wish lists of the various  
11 departments and Ms. Bazemore, with staff. We've been  
12 able to start to cut back on items that are less  
13 urgent, focusing on those that have a regulatory  
14 requirement to fulfill and others that are necessary  
15 to capture and end of life situation; we certainly  
16 have pipes that we need to change, certain things we  
17 have to do. We have to focus on them first.

18 MR. SMITH: Exactly, exactly.

19 MR. WARD: That's where we are.

20 MR. SMITH: But my suggestion is we  
21 can't flirt our -- I'm trying to find the word, to  
22 our success with the City, going through what they're  
23 going through and the other -- I mean, residents of  
24 the City, seeing us, I'm saying this in a way that we  
25 got -- we're doing a lot of things maybe we should

1 cut back on and until we get ourselves straightened  
2 the way that it should be, don't flirt in --

3 MR. WARD: You're absolutely --

4 MR. SMITH: I don't know how to word  
5 it.

6 MR. WARD: You're actually in cinque  
7 with our last meeting. Our last meeting we had  
8 talked about setting a date of October something for  
9 an annual dinner. And we've had second thoughts that  
10 particularly with the closing of the casinos and the  
11 number of unemployed expected, we can't go into a  
12 casino and have a big party and dinner and so forth  
13 and so on.

14 MR. SMITH: That's what I was trying to  
15 say.

16 MR. WARD: That's been taken off and  
17 we'll still have our holiday party, which will be  
18 here in the office.

19 MR. SMITH: Here, right.

20 MR. WARD: And have a little bit of  
21 food and give everybody hope for the next year, but  
22 again, we are very very conscious of the budget  
23 stress and the impact that we have internally and  
24 what the appearance should be going forward outside  
25 in our community.

1 MR. SMITH: You worded it better than I  
2 did, Bruce, and I relay that also to Andy.

3 MR. WEBER: I was going to say I've  
4 been conveying those records on a regular basis to  
5 Rafael, and it just happens all of the contracts are  
6 up by the end of this year.

7 MR. SMITH: Exactly.

8 MR. WEBER: And we all know the  
9 discussions that I've been having with the unions and  
10 I continue to press the issue, so to speak.

11 MR. SMITH: Okay.

12 MR. HILL: Okay.

13 MR. WARD: Okay. Any questions on --  
14 we're at shut offs, shut offs. Any questions on the  
15 shut off list?

16 MS. BAZEMORE: I just wanted to mention  
17 when you look at the list as far as the casinos that  
18 are closing, Showboat, the Plaza and even Atlantic  
19 Club, they're all current. Revel has not paid us  
20 since they filed bankruptcy, so they're showing on  
21 the delinquent report of the shut off report.

22 MR. WARD: Questions on engineering  
23 committee meeting? Engineering met, discussed a  
24 number of issues; budget being, again, one of the  
25 first issues we came up with.

1 MR. HILL: I notice we paid a big check  
2 to the water tank people. So I'm assuming, Claude,  
3 we're in pretty good shape, we're done?

4 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: We're pretty much  
5 closer to being done.

6 MR. SMITH: I thought you said it was  
7 complete?

8 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: No, no, the work is  
9 done, construction work is done. In regards to the  
10 payment portion, we have not fully paid out the full  
11 amount of the contract.

12 MR. HILL: But the project is done?

13 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: Correct.

14 MR. SMITH: Why haven't we paid them?  
15 Just -- is it something pending?

16 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: We have, okay, Linda  
17 informed me that the retainer is about \$150,000. And  
18 of course some of the work that was actually  
19 completed in the latter stages of it has not been  
20 paid, so the verification of all that work that was  
21 actually done is now going through the process, and  
22 then payment will be released on that particular  
23 portion of money that was owed.

24 MR. SMITH: Stay on top of it. Make  
25 sure it's done well because it looks good.

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: We are doing that.

2 MR. SMITH: Very good.

3 MR. WARD: Questions on personnel  
4 committee meeting?

5 MR. SMITH: None.

6 MR. WARD: Okay. Director's Forum.

7 MR. WEBER: Are we going into Closed  
8 Session one more time?

9 MR. WARD: That's Executive Session.

10 MR. SMITH: I spoke. Any other members  
11 have anything?

12 MR. HILL: No.

13 MR. WARD: Public Participation we've  
14 had and there are no further individuals.

15 Old Business. Accept bids on Zeta Lyte  
16 Anionic Polymer. Did I pronounce that right, Mr.  
17 Moyle?

18 MR. MOYLE: We aren't accepting bids  
19 yet. They're being pushed back around 60 days. The  
20 apparent low bidding has to come in, and test the  
21 product, they're supposed to do that next week, save  
22 the MUA almost two grand. What is the whole  
23 contract, 24? It's still money saved if it works,  
24 but we'll push it back. We have enough of that  
25 product and I think there is still some money left on

1 the current contract.

2 MR. HILL: So we're pulling 7 a?

3 MR. MOYLE: Yes.

4 MR. WARD: Okay. 7 b, engineering.

5 Mr. Smith?

6 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: First item, Aclara  
7 Sensus made a solution. The last several Board  
8 meetings I've actually come in and informed the Board  
9 that we have been having some problems in regards to  
10 the MTUs reading the iPERL meters. We requested some  
11 information and the solution from Aclara and a time  
12 line in regards to when that solution might actually  
13 be obtained. But so far, we have not received any  
14 time line or date of when that resolution may be  
15 acquired. We discussed this in our engineering  
16 meeting, and pretty much a general consensus that we  
17 need to send Aclara some form of a letter stating  
18 they're not in compliance with their contract and  
19 they have not met their obligations.

20 MR. WARD: Stop one second. Mr. Bor,  
21 did we get you the Aclara contract?

22 MR. BOR: I just got it this morning,  
23 so it looks like they're making that shift to legal  
24 intervention.

25 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: Correct.

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 MR. WARD: What I understand this to  
2 be, we went into contract for the equipment, one of  
3 which is a meter and one of which reads the  
4 information digitally. That connection, in terms of  
5 being able to transfer the information from one to  
6 the other is a contract provision. It is in the  
7 contract that they must communicate. We have not had  
8 compliance on that portion of the contract.

9 It has now become a frustration in  
10 distribution. We've had to go out and do  
11 double-check reads and so forth and so on, so we need  
12 to now draw a line in the sand because we've had a  
13 number of delays. We've asked them to indicate when  
14 are they going to resolve the communications issue.  
15 They say soon, they say soon, they say soon, and it  
16 hasn't been done.

17 MR. SMITH: Is that all on account? Do  
18 we pay them monthly or pay them by the job? How does  
19 that work?

20 MR. WARD: We purchased a number of  
21 these meters, and the meters are ready and in fact  
22 some of the meters have already been installed, but  
23 they're not communicating with the --

24 MR. SMITH: They're not doing what  
25 they're supposed to?

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 MR. WARD: They're not communicating.  
2 We can go out and read them.

3 MR. SMITH: But are we still paying  
4 them, is what I'm saying?

5 MR. WARD: We have to make sure -- this  
6 is a decision, is this a system we can go forward  
7 with? We have to figure that out. And if they  
8 cannot make the connection per the contract, it is  
9 not a system we can go forward with.

10 MR. SMITH: Understood.

11 MR. WARD: We can't pay for something  
12 that does not work.

13 MR. SMITH: What I'm trying to  
14 understand, were they paid or are we in the process  
15 of paying them monthly?

16 MS. BAZEMORE: We still have 40,000 on  
17 our books for the MTUs.

18 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: Correct.

19 MS. BAZEMORE: 500 MTUs.

20 MR. SMITH: And you pay them monthly?

21 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: No, this was paid as  
22 per contract. The contract included delivery of over  
23 a thousand MTUs.

24 MR. SMITH: What I'm trying to  
25 establish, if they're not doing what they required,

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 stop payment.

2 MS. BAZEMORE: We've already invested  
3 so much in. The first 500 we bought and paid for and  
4 we still have open on the contract for 500, but we've  
5 invested money into the contract.

6 MR. WARD: We've invested into the  
7 system. Here is where we are. We are now at the  
8 point where we have to have a legal intervention and  
9 I believe that the legal intervention at this time  
10 must state, you must have it done by September the  
11 5th.

12 MR. SMITH: Got you.

13 MR. WARD: By September the 5th if this  
14 does not work, then we have to begin to address and  
15 proceed on our remedies, whatever those are.

16 MR. SMITH: Take care of your business,  
17 okay.

18 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: Item number two,  
19 again, the two million gallon tank, that is  
20 completed. We are just waiting for some additional,  
21 I keep on repeating myself, punch list items to be  
22 completed. They're in the process of installing one  
23 of the lamps that was destroyed during the process of  
24 doing the painting of the tank and there are some  
25 other small items that need to be done. We are

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 paying them accordingly. We are just, as just  
2 mentioned, there is \$150,000 that's in retainage that  
3 was -- that is still being withheld and we have one  
4 payment that's actually going to be processed for  
5 what, 61, \$61,000 and that's it for this particular  
6 Board session or this period.

7 ASR Wells, O and M Manuals and  
8 As-Builts. Good news, we have received our O and M  
9 Manuals from the contractor and in the process of  
10 doing that. Once that is actually reviewed, we'll be  
11 in touch with the engineers to approve the O and M  
12 Manuals to be delivered to us. Once that's done,  
13 hopefully, the engineer will sign off on CCC, which  
14 is contract certification or contract certification  
15 compliance form. And that will be sent to the State  
16 and we can start looking to further closeout of this  
17 particular project.

18 I'll skip number four for right now and  
19 go to number five and come back to number four.  
20 Cradles, we received the As-Builts on the Cradle  
21 project. Again, I'm also reviewing those. I'm  
22 completed about -- completed reviewing them. That  
23 will be sent back to the engineer as soon as  
24 possible. Of course, this project is still an  
25 ongoing project. Even though we might reach this

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 portion of getting additional items from the engineer  
2 and the contract itself, but we still have the  
3 environmental aspect of it and we still have to be in  
4 compliance with, and until we meet that portion of  
5 the compliance, this project will still be an open  
6 project so you will be hearing more about this as we  
7 go along.

8           Going back to the employee injury,  
9 number four. Let me pass this around. Some of you  
10 have already seen it. On August 6th, we had an  
11 injury at the plant. Apparently this injury was a  
12 severe injury by one of our employees. This  
13 individual was actually instructed to do some wash  
14 down of the clarifier. I'm passing some pictures  
15 around that you can get an idea of what this  
16 clarifier looks like. The individual was instructed  
17 to go up on top of the clarifier, into a catwalk and  
18 use a fire hose and actually wash down the interior  
19 of the clarifier. The individual made a decision to  
20 have a ladder go down into the clarifier and continue  
21 to do some of the wash down work.

22           From my understanding, the individual  
23 made several trips up and down this ladder while in  
24 the clarifier and apparently on the last trip of  
25 going up the clarifier to dispose of some debris that

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 was in the clarifier, he fell. The falling of this  
2 individual resulted in his femur being broken and  
3 apparently a kneecap being broken, as well too. Both  
4 on the right side.

5 Of course, emergency rescue was  
6 actually done, fire, police and EMTs was actually  
7 there to escort, assist and escort this individual  
8 out of the clarifier. Of course, he was taken to the  
9 medical -- Atlantic City Medical Center. Came back  
10 to Atlantic City where surgery was performed on him.  
11 Since then that individual had to go through some  
12 form of therapy, and from my understanding, he will  
13 be out of the hospital today, sent home, but will  
14 require to have a hospital bed and a wheelchair  
15 because of the fact that he cannot walk.

16 MR. SMITH: What's his name?

17 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: Scott Haynes. We  
18 did request some information from the person that was  
19 actually an eyewitness and also the supervisor in  
20 regards to the instructions that was given and pretty  
21 much what took place while that individual was  
22 actually doing the work on the clarifier.

23 Of course, it's going to be a pretty  
24 big loss for us in regards to our mod and also in  
25 regards to just the accident itself, so we're still

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 in the infancy process of this accident and trying to  
2 find out what the reserves will be and pretty much  
3 what the cost is going to be for this particular  
4 accident.

5 MR. SMITH: There goes your --

6 MR. BOR: Workers comp.

7 MR. SMITH: -- workers comp and your  
8 off day for election day.

9 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: This fell outside of  
10 the cutoff time period for that time frame.

11 MR. SMITH: In other words, you're  
12 still trying to get that? I understand where you're  
13 coming from.

14 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: But believe you me,  
15 this one particular accident will definitely wipe out  
16 that time period, no matter what.

17 MR. SMITH: Is the guy okay?

18 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: He's alive. He  
19 probably is in severe pain right now, probably very  
20 well medicated, but you know.

21 MR. SMITH: That's the most important  
22 thing, he's okay. We remedied the problem, so to  
23 speak.

24 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: The remedy, well,  
25 there is a couple things that probably were

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 definitely not followed in terms of the entry into  
2 that location. Of course, when you're going into a  
3 location of this, and the picture shows, that ladder  
4 should be tied off at all times. If that ladder is  
5 not tied off, and you have to take a picture of how  
6 that the clarifier is actually configured, the bottom  
7 of that clarifier is actually sloped; it's not a flat  
8 surface.

9 MR. SMITH: How many people were  
10 working there, Claude?

11 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: At the time of the  
12 accident was two individuals, the individual that got  
13 injured and one additional individual that was up  
14 top, manning the pumps or looking after the pumps  
15 that was of course giving him water to actually wash  
16 down the clarifier.

17 MR. SMITH: What was the cause of the  
18 accident, did they say?

19 MR. WARD: It's still under  
20 investigation. I assigned Claude to lead the  
21 investigation and report back. I think initially,  
22 the Board needs to know that we held a training  
23 session on --

24 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: Confined space.

25 MR. WARD: In which this individual was

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 a participant in that training session. And it's no  
2 more than what, a week and a half after that?

3 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: The training for  
4 confined space and lockout tagout was held in May.  
5 Now, we try to be proactive, and just to let you  
6 know, some of these particular trainings that we do  
7 is to at least inform individuals of what their  
8 responsibilities are actually whenever they go onto  
9 certain work task assignments or whatever it might  
10 actually be.

11 This particular location you consider  
12 to be a confined space. It has limited access. It's  
13 not a location that's acceptable for a person to  
14 inhabit for any long period of time and it only has  
15 no ingress and egress because of the fact that you  
16 have to access it by a ladder; you can't walk in and  
17 out of that location.

18 But the confined space entry and  
19 lockout tagout was actually held in May. You're  
20 talking about this happening in August. These  
21 individuals are aware and informed and trained in  
22 regards to these particular entries and locations.

23 MR. SMITH: If my location is correct,  
24 this guy has been accident prone anyway?

25 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: Yes, yes. In

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 regards to the assignment, the assignment was not  
2 necessarily for him to go down into the clarifier but  
3 to stay up on top of the clarifier and wash the walls  
4 down or the bottom of it down.

5 MR. SMITH: My point is, he wasn't  
6 supervised properly, evidently. Especially knowing  
7 this kind of guy we're dealing with and what the  
8 situation was, and I'm not blaming anybody because  
9 you're saying it's under investigation, I'm going to  
10 wait and see. This is not the end of this, you know  
11 that.

12 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: Correct, absolutely.

13 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Where was the  
14 supervisor supposed to be on this job, with him?

15 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: Well, the individual  
16 that was a supervisor at the time assigned him some  
17 location, he had some rounds that he was actually  
18 doing. And I guess by the time he either got back to  
19 this particular location, the accident already  
20 occurred. The accident occurred at 9:30 in the  
21 morning, so it was early in the morning that this  
22 actually happened.

23 MR. WARD: We get --

24 MR. SMITH: As a matter of fact, I  
25 think we was having a meeting, that was our personnel

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 meeting. We were here.

2 MR. WARD: -- the tension between  
3 supervision and micromanagement and one extreme or  
4 the other. Clearly this investigation will continue.  
5 We're going to get all the statements that are  
6 relevant, that are responsive to this accident, and  
7 that will be a matter of public record.

8 MR. SMITH: All I'm interested in is  
9 not a recurrence of this same type of thing, and that  
10 the person is not fatally injured or whatever, we  
11 don't have this happen again, but do what you have to  
12 do.

13 MR. WARD: Okay. We're on New  
14 Business. Abatements, first is 8 a (1), Michael  
15 Kerley. It's indicated that he is necessary to  
16 appear. It doesn't appear that he is here. This  
17 matter gets tabled.

18 And with the abatements (2), (3), (4)  
19 and (5), if it's the Board's pleasure, that can be  
20 taken up together.

21 MS. BAZEMORE: I think (3) needs to be  
22 tabled, as well.

23 MR. WARD: Which one?

24 MS. BAZEMORE: (3).

25 MR. WARD: Clinton and Maryanne

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 Sharman?

2 MS. BAZEMORE: Rafal Debiec. Some  
3 additional documents are required since he has a  
4 multi dwelling unit. It hasn't been provided as yet.

5 MR. SMITH: What are you doing, tabling  
6 (1) and (3)?

7 MS. BAZEMORE: And I'm waiting to hear  
8 from him.

9 MR. SMITH: Tabling a (1) and (3)?

10 MR. HILL: Right.

11 MR. SMITH: And the rest --

12 MR. BOR: (2), (4), (5), move them  
13 together.

14 MR. HILL: Move them.

15 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Second.

16 MR. BOR: Mr. Lea?

17 MR. LEA: Yes.

18 MR. BOR: McGettigan?

19 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Yes.

20 MR. BOR: Hill?

21 MR. HILL: Yes.

22 MR. BOR: Smith?

23 MR. SMITH: Yes.

24 MR. BOR: (2), (4) and (5).

25 MR. HILL: Insurance time again.

1 MR. WARD: Insurance.

2 MR. HILL: Again.

3 MR. WARD: Request for proposal.

4 MR. HILL: We do this every year.

5 MR. BOR: Seems like every month.

6 MS. BAZEMORE: One slight difference.

7 We actually punched out the workers comp from the bid  
8 package. We're going to go out separately. We were  
9 informed that we could get competitive prices on our  
10 own and avoid the brokerage fee.

11 MR. WARD: And that's going to be  
12 resolution 8 b (1) before you.

13 MR. HILL: I move 8 b (1).

14 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Second.

15 MR. BOR: Mr. Lea?

16 MR. LEA: Yes.

17 MR. BOR: McGettigan?

18 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Yes.

19 MR. BOR: Hill?

20 MR. HILL: Yes.

21 MR. BOR: Smith?

22 MR. SMITH: Yes.

23 MR. WARD: Information item, which is  
24 telecommunications 6 million gallon tank. We  
25 received a notice from Metro PCS, that they were

2 telecommunications antenna on the top of the 6  
3 million gallon tank.

4 MR. SMITH: I thought they were giving  
5 us 25,000 a year?

6 MR. WARD: 30.

8 MR. WARD: So what we are going to do  
9 is we're going to come back out with an RFP and send  
10 it out to all of the telecommunications industry,  
11 because when you go over Route 30 and you look into  
12 the skyline, our tank is about the highest thing out  
13 there in that region, so we want to make sure that  
14 telecommunications, as they move more towards a 4G  
15 platform have the opportunity to do it.

16 MS. BAZEMORE: We missed that one.

17 MR. WARD: I'm sorry, I missed that  
18 one, I missed the workers comp.

19 MS. BAZEMORE: That's the official for  
20 insurance. They just have the name and a  
21 representative for their insurance, I think that's 8  
22 b (1).

23 MR. WARD: 8 b (1) is a resolution. I  
24 moved ahead, I'm sorry.

25 MR. BOR: We already moved on 8 b (1).

1 MS. BAZEMORE: (1) (a).

2 MR. BOR: It's already been a  
3 resolution 8 b (1). Resolution, separate one, 8 b  
4 (1) (a), the employment of administration.

5 MR. HILL: This is the workmans comp?

6 MR. WARD: Yes.

7 MS. BAZEMORE: It's for administrative  
8 official. Someone has to be named from the  
9 organization as an administrative official. I think  
10 I'm normally named every year. We to have this  
11 designation.

12 MR. HILL: Move.

13 MR. SMITH: Second.

14 MR. BOR: Mr. Lea?

15 MR. LEA: Yes.

16 MR. BOR: McGettigan?

17 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Yes.

18 MR. BOR: Hill?

19 MR. HILL: Yes.

20 MR. BOR: Smith?

21 MR. SMITH: Yes.

22 MR. WARD: Okay. That was (1) (a).

23 Again, we're going to be coming back  
24 out for new proposals to allow telecommunications  
25 organizations to put their sensors on top of our

2 MR. SMITH: How many do we have up  
3 there, Linda? I thought we had more than one.

4 MS. BAZEMORE: We have another contract  
5 with, I think it's Sprint, which T-Mobile bought out.  
6 This one is Metro.

7 MR. WARD: This is Metro PCS.

8 MS. BAZEMORE: So T-Mobile and Metro, I  
9 think they're the same company, but we do have one  
10 other contract on the books, close to the 30,000.

11 MR. WARD: We have resolution 8 c for  
12 accounting and auditing services.

13 MR. HILL: This is for the one year?

14 MS. BAZEMORE: Yes.

15 MR. HILL: Any changes from last year's  
16 contract?

17 MS. BAZEMORE: The dollar amount is the  
18 same. It's Ford, Scott.

19 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Same.

20 MR. HILL: I move to accept 8 c  
21 resolution.

22 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Second. Was there no  
23 other? We're going to go next year?

24 MS. BAZEMORE: Next year.

25 MR. BOR: Mr. Lea?

2 MR. BOR: McGettigan?

3 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Yes.

12 MS. BAZEMORE: We don't do the  
13 agreement until we get the check.

14 MR. WARD: We didn't get the check yet.  
15 We can explain what's going on with Beachview.  
16 Beachview came in with an application to proceed as a  
17 50 percent nonprofit, and I took a look at the  
18 application and we jointly reviewed the applications  
19 together, Mr. Bor and Mr. Weber and Ms. Bazemore and  
20 Mr. Moyle. Beachview was coming in as an LP, which  
21 is a limited partnership. And all of the documents  
22 clearly show a for profit presence throughout and we  
23 went back and looked again closely at the statute.

24 The statute is very clear. You either  
25 have to be a not for profit or public housing

1 authority in order to get a 50 percent reduction in  
2 your service agreement, so we would not move on this  
3 as a 50 percent. They will have to come in with a  
4 check for the 100 percent in order to proceed.

5 MR. HILL: So we talked about this in  
6 engineering, so they still haven't proven that  
7 they're a 501(c)(3)?

8 MS. BAZEMORE: That they agree, that  
9 they don't have the document and they'll pay the full  
10 price.

11 MR. BOR: They acquiesced and they're  
12 willing to back -- the existence of the LP is more  
13 important to them than the \$55,000. They're willing  
14 to pay full freight.

15 MR. HILL: Last week we didn't know  
16 that.

17 MR. WARD: Yes, we cleared that.

18 Okay, so down to checking account  
19 services, Fulton Bank, which is resolution 8 f (1).

20 MR. SMITH: You're moving from Sun?

21 MS. BAZEMORE: To Fulton and this is  
22 just for the signature cards authorization of the  
23 Board Members for signatures.

24 MR. SMITH: Move it.

25 MR. HILL: Second.

1 MR. BOR: Mr. Lea?

2 MR. LEA: Yes.

3 MR. BOR: McGettigan?

4 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Yes.

5 MR. BOR: Hill?

6 MR. HILL: Yes.

7 MR. BOR: Smith?

8 MR. SMITH: Yes.

9 MR. BOR: Carries.

10 MR. WARD: Okay. And we have received  
11 leaves of absence, which is on resolution 8 g, George  
12 Coles, Ed Jones, Nicholas Mancuso. They are all  
13 together.

14 MR. SMITH: Are they on leaves of  
15 absence or are they coming off of leaves of absence?

16 MR. MOYLE: They're back.

17 MR. SMITH: So what are you asking for?

18 MR. MOYLE: They're back.

19 MR. MCGETTIGAN: It says for unpaid  
20 leave.

21 MR. MOYLE: They were unpaid. They  
22 were unpaid. Two of them got paid by the State,  
23 family leave for birth of a child.

24 MR. SMITH: What I'm trying to say, I  
25 thought we already authorized that.

1 MS. BAZEMORE: We didn't do one  
2 previously.

3 MR. SMITH: I don't think so.

4 MS. BAZEMORE: Typically it's before  
5 they go out and basically to cover them, but now  
6 they're back.

7 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Postdate it.

8 MR. SMITH: Move it.

9 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Second.

10 MR. BOR: That's for all three, (1),  
11 (2) and (3).

12 MR. WARD: 8 g is on one resolution.

13 MR. BOR: Mr. Lea?

14 MR. LEA: Yes.

15 MR. BOR: McGettigan?

16 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Yes.

17 MR. BOR: Hill?

18 MR. HILL: Yes.

19 MR. BOR: Smith?

20 MR. SMITH: Yes.

21 MR. WARD: Okay. Interconnection  
22 Agreement, City of Ventnor. We have that to pass  
23 out?

24 MR. BOR: Yes.

25 MR. WARD: We had an ongoing agreement

1 with the City of Ventnor, which provides for an  
2 emergency interconnection. In the case that Ventnor  
3 has a water service issue, they can call us and  
4 request us to open a valve and we can send them  
5 water. Admittedly, it also opens the other way back  
6 to us. And so this is just to continue our agreement  
7 for another five years.

8 MR. BOR: This agreement has been in  
9 effect 15 years, maybe, maybe more. And it's always  
10 worked and it's always been cooperative. As I think  
11 we reported previously, Bruce and I met with the  
12 folks in Ventnor to see if they wanted to have a  
13 conversation about extending the relationship and  
14 apparently they do not.

15 And this agreement, which is very  
16 simplistic and basic although gets what we need it to  
17 say, was supposed to be reviewed by their borough  
18 solicitor, and both the Executive Director and I have  
19 reached out to her numerous times and apparently she  
20 does not have anything to provide by way of  
21 additional modifications, so I'm recommending  
22 approval. It's the same as done before. Simple, but  
23 gets right to the point.

24 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Garth, do we control  
25 the valve or do we open it and our meter reads?

1 MR. MOYLE: We can control valves.  
2 They always call us, Tom Klein.

3 MR. MCGETTIGAN: And they open it?

4 MR. MOYLE: Or we'll be there with  
5 them. They had it open recently because that well in  
6 the Heights, you've seen that new well, that's  
7 impressive. That thing is high, but that's got to be  
8 a million and a half dollars right there. But yeah,  
9 they've had it open.

10 MR. MCGETTIGAN: But at this point they  
11 had to come to us for control?

12 MR. MOYLE: Yeah, yeah, yeah.

13 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Sounds good, move it.

14 MR. SMITH: Second.

15 MR. BOR: Mr. Lea?

16 MR. LEA: Yes.

17 MR. BOR: McGettigan?

18 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Yes.

19 MR. BOR: Hill?

20 MR. HILL: Yes.

21 MR. BOR: Smith?

22 MR. SMITH: Yes.

23 MR. BOR: Carries.

24 MR. WARD: Okay. Energy, we've had  
25 extended discussions with the Board of Public

1 Utilities on the potential of creating a solar plant  
2 -- excuse me, a combined heat and power plant, CHP,  
3 over at the plant. That mission was all about,  
4 number one, containing costs of energy, and number  
5 two, sustainability. Sustainability in the case of a  
6 major storm, where the grid goes out, we would have  
7 power.

8 The Board of Public Utilities asked us  
9 to reach out to Concord Engineering, which was the  
10 engineering company that did our audit, and have them  
11 take a look at, number one, our power needs and also  
12 the power needs of Pleasantville's Leeds Avenue  
13 School, which was our proposed energy off take, the  
14 thermal energy from the CHP would go there. The  
15 determination came back that Leeds Avenue School was  
16 not sufficient enough to take our off take and we  
17 were advised to pursue a solar project at the plant.  
18 I now have 95 percent complete, I've completed 95  
19 percent of a solar RFP, which I hope to bring to your  
20 attention next month for the plant.

21 The last remaining issue is the amount  
22 of open space that's going to be available at the  
23 rear. We've resolved that this is the former basin  
24 area that for the most part, can work. There's going  
25 to have to also be some ground modifications going on

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 here. But my question is whether or not the DEP or  
2 any other regulatory agency would allow us to take  
3 some further trees and expand that area. In  
4 addition, we took a look at the grass when you come  
5 to the front of the plant. It's really nice. It  
6 looks pretty, but we're at a situation now where  
7 we've got to consider what we can potentially bring  
8 to stabilize the costs of operating the Authority.

9 And at this point, we talked in  
10 engineering about utilizing some of the grass in  
11 front of the building. It appears that the grass on  
12 the north side, so when you're coming into the plant,  
13 that would be on your right-hand side, it would be  
14 behind the house that the Authority has leased over  
15 to Ernie. That side could be used for solar. The  
16 left side, which is the larger side, has the pipes  
17 that are sending the water into Atlantic City  
18 underneath and we, in discussion with Garth and our  
19 staff, we don't want to place anything on top of  
20 those pipes in the case that there is an emergency  
21 and we have to get under there.

22 MR. SMITH: I thought you were going to  
23 use the roof area?

24 MS. BAZEMORE: That was years ago.

25 MR. SMITH: You can't use that?

1 MR. WARD: The RFP is going to go out  
2 to solar companies to allow them to come back in with  
3 their solutions, and the roof is an alternative to  
4 include as well as the ground areas. We're going to  
5 try to get as much.

6 MR. SMITH: It's cheaper? Nothing is  
7 cheap.

8 MR. WARD: We don't spend any dollars,  
9 but we just want to set it up in a way that the best  
10 bang comes back to us and if they can cover the roof.

11 MR. SMITH: Being that the case, let  
12 them do what they can do.

13 MR. WARD: If they can deploy the roof  
14 areas and the ground, so it's an either or proposal.

15 MR. SMITH: When are they coming in?

16 MR. WARD: I want to resolve the land  
17 issues this month and next month, be ready to have an  
18 RFP for your approval, and it would go out for solar.

19 MR. SMITH: Get that done as soon as  
20 possible. Because if that can save us off that  
21 million dollars a year electric bill.

22 MR. WARD: It will cut into it. Might  
23 not hit the whole million.

24 MR. SMITH: Every little bit helps, all  
25 the casinos leaving us.

1 MR. WARD: The RFP's got to address the  
2 grants that are available at the Board of Public  
3 Utilities for sustainability, so these will all be a  
4 part of the RFP.

5 MR. SMITH: Stay on top of it, Bruce.  
6 We need all the help. What about the wind thing? We  
7 don't have any deals with the wind?

8 MR. WARD: We don't have a wind  
9 potential now.

10 MR. SMITH: Whose are they? I thought  
11 they were some of ours.

12 MR. WARD: That's the A.C.U.A.

13 MR. HILL: Atlantic County Utility  
14 Authority.

15 MR. WARD: They attacked wind at a time  
16 when the door was open and that door closed.

17 MR. SMITH: I was only messing with  
18 you. I don't think we had a shot at that.

19 MR. WARD: On August the 4th I met with  
20 Congressman LoBiondo and my meeting was to advise him  
21 and alert him of our interest in working closely with  
22 the FAA. Mr. LoBiondo's assistant has been our go-  
23 between back and forth over a number of issues, one  
24 of which is the floating solar array, which we are --  
25 I'm going to talk about on the c. I advised

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1       Congressman of that. And the second was our interest  
2       in acquiring surplus military equipment. A number of  
3       New Jersey cities, towns under New Jersey Emergency  
4       Management have been able to acquire some of the high  
5       clearance trucks coming out of the military and it's  
6       my thoughts if we could get a couple of those trucks  
7       for free, it will help to supplement our forces when  
8       we have to go out. And particularly this is a town  
9       where the streets flood sometimes.

10               MR. SMITH: That's a good idea.

11               MR. WARD: It's hard to get over there  
12       to get to something else.

13               MR. MOYLE: Do you know if you need a  
14       CDL for those?

15               MR. WARD: We'll address that later.  
16       We'll send somebody to school for that.

17               MR. SMITH: You have to train them for  
18       that, too.

19               MR. MCGETTIGAN: I have a CDL.

20               MR. SMITH: That's a good idea, Bruce.

21               MR. WARD: And I've also asked the  
22       Congressman to get a small boat. We need a boat to  
23       be able to navigate on the reservoirs. There are  
24       some areas on the reservoirs that are inaccessible by  
25       land vehicles, and that request has been coming in

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 from the plant staff, so we're requesting the  
2 Congressman's assistance.

3 MR. SMITH: Who do we usually use,  
4 State Police or the National Guard on those type of  
5 things, when the City gets involved in an emergency?  
6 I can't remember whether it was the National Guard or  
7 State Police.

8 MR. WARD: The State has to create an  
9 emergency for the National Guard to come out.

10 MR. SMITH: Understood.

11 MR. WARD: Certainly the County has  
12 assets also under the County Emergency Management  
13 program and that's Vince Jones and he can send assets  
14 out if it's just an emergency that effects Atlantic  
15 County or region.

16 MR. SMITH: What I was asking, that  
17 last storm we had, who came out? I mean, who was in  
18 charge?

19 MR. WARD: Well, the Governor created a  
20 statewide emergency and the island was in fact closed  
21 to traffic for a couple of days.

22 MR. SMITH: Except for what the Mayor  
23 opened.

24 MR. WARD: I'm not going there, but all  
25 I know is that the Governor actually had units of

1 other County Sheriff's Officers manning the points of  
2 entry coming into the City.

3 MR. SMITH: State Police because when I  
4 come in, I had to use my ID to come in.

5 But what I'm saying, was that the  
6 National Guard or the State Police or whatever that  
7 come in and took over, so to speak, the Governor made  
8 the declaration?

9 MR. WARD: The Governor could create  
10 the emergency and then the question is what assets  
11 did you want to send out to during the emergency?  
12 The Governor has the National Guard. I'm sure they  
13 were used in North Jersey where the storm was more  
14 intense, but down here I don't know that we saw  
15 National Guard assets. I know we saw County assets,  
16 State Police and all that, yeah.

17 MR. HILL: Because it wasn't --

18 MR. WARD: We weren't as intense as  
19 North Jersey.

20 MR. SMITH: To me it was.

21 MR. WARD: We dodged a bullet.

22 August the 12th I met with the FAA and  
23 I met with, at this time, all of the department  
24 directors of the various units who have been  
25 considering our floating solar array project. That

## ATLANTIC CITY MUA

1 would be environmental, business, engineering, all of  
2 their units. It was about 12 guys in the room.  
3 Basically, they reported to me that they have no  
4 serious objections with the floating solar array  
5 project.

6           There is one matter, which I am  
7 investigating, to try to resolve to their concern and  
8 that is they do not want floating solar panels to be  
9 an inviting landing space for birds because they wish  
10 to deter bidders from all of the air traffic that  
11 goes on out there, and I've been reading all about  
12 bird deterrents and I think we can satisfy that.

13           The second thing they said is they  
14 don't want to talk to me or they don't want to see  
15 any paper until after October the 1st, which is their  
16 budget, because everything now is to close out the  
17 Federal budget year. So you can expect by October  
18 the 15th, I wish to have close to the final agreement  
19 with the FAA in terms of a floating solar array on  
20 the upper reservoir.

21           Different and apart from solar at the  
22 plant, solar at the plant is again, the mission is  
23 sustainability and cost containment. At the FAA, it  
24 is only about dollars and cents that we can capture.  
25 We don't capture the energy because the FAA purchases

1 all of the energy. We can hopefully, if the dollars  
2 and cents work for us, we get a portion of the energy  
3 savings and as well as a rental piece for the  
4 platform, which is the reservoir. So again, that's a  
5 revenue generating project that we hope to be  
6 successful with at the FAA. Any questions on energy?

7 MR. SMITH: You won't hear anything  
8 from them until October or November?

9 MR. WARD: You will hear in September  
10 on the plant. In September on the plant, I intend to  
11 have an RFP.

12 MR. SMITH: I understood that. I'm  
13 talking about the other part.

14 MR. WARD: On the FAA, next two months,  
15 we wish to ramp out our energy projects that we have  
16 been working on.

17 MR. SMITH: Okay. Closed Session,  
18 let's take a five-minute break.

19 MR. WARD: Bills.

20 MR. BOR: Got to pay the bills.

21 MR. SMITH: Move, pay the bills.

22 MR. HILL: Second.

23 MR. BOR: Mr. Lea?

24 MR. LEA: Yes.

25 MR. BOR: McGettigan?

1 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Yes.

2 MR. BOR: Hill?

3 MR. HILL: Yes.

8 service to ascertain their approval of the scope of  
9 the agreement.

10 MR. WEBER: And if they sign off, we're  
11 signing off.

12 MR. WARD: Yes, uh-huh. As far as  
13 union contracts are concerned, there is no movement  
14 on union contracts.

15 The Borgata connection fee lawsuit had  
16 been discussed as well as the Aclara iPERL Sensus  
17 meters. As far as the Aclara, Counsel -- actually,  
18 Solicitor will forward a letter indicating that  
19 December -- excuse me, September the 5th is going to  
20 have to be a deadline in terms of their determination  
21 of the connectivity between those units.

22 Mr. Bor will contact the parties in the  
23 administration building roof repair and see if we can  
24 work through a solution. Board President signed off  
25 on our new water distribution manager, Mr. Joel

1 White's contract, and the discussion of the water  
2 treatment plant operator Sabrina Showell will be  
3 moved to the next personnel committee meeting and  
4 that will conclude the Executive Session.

5 MR. SMITH: Move for adjournment.

6 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Second.

7 MR. BOR: Hearing no objection?

8 (The meeting adjourned at 12:15 p.m.)
