2 meeting has been provided, as required by law, by  
3 mailing to the Press a list of the regularly  
4 scheduled meetings of the Board of Directors,  
5 including the notice of the regular meeting scheduled  
6 April 16, 2015, at 401 North Virginia Avenue,  
7 conference room, Atlantic City, New Jersey. A copy  
8 of said notice was sent to the city clerk to be  
9 posted. All of the aforesaid complies with Chapter  
10 231 of the laws of 1975, otherwise known as the open  
11 public meetings law.

12 So we're going to have our call to  
13 order.

14 MR. BOR: Roll call. Ms. Bailey?

15 MS. BAILEY: Here.

16 MR. BOR: Mr. Cheatham?

17 MR. CHEATHAM: Here.

8 month.

9 MR. BOR: Mr. Cheatham, abstain?

3 For our new Members of the Board, an  
4 abatement is a request by a citizen customer, when  
5 there was apparently some malfunction in the system.  
6 They might have had a leak or something and there was  
7 an excessive charge. So we're going to be voting on  
8 8.a.(1) and that would be for Mr. Quang Pham.

9 MR. PHAM: Yes.

10 MR. WARD: I did check with our system.  
11 While this is an unusually larger number, we  
12 generally have numbers somewhere in the 400 to 300  
13 range, but our system indicated that Mr. Pham did not  
14 have adequate notice of the malfunction in his system  
15 during the period.

16 MS. BAZEMORE: It's for four quarters,  
17 for a full year for the abatement.

18 MR. HILL: Versus just a quarter, so  
19 the abatement comes to --

20 MR. WARD: \$1,132.83. Motion?

21 MR. HILL: Any questions for the  
22 abatement?

23 MR. MCGETTIGAN: I'll make a motion for  
24 it.

25 MR. COLANZI: Second.

6 want to sincerely warmly welcome our new Board

7 Members, Mr. Cheatham and Ms. Bailey.

8 MS. BAILEY: Thank you.

9 MR. CHEATHAM: Thank you.

10 MR. WARD: The Atlantic City Municipal  
11 Utilities Authority has a gloried history, going back  
12 to actually the founders of Atlantic City, who  
13 recognized that to create a world class resort, that  
14 water was essential. And they went and purchased  
15 water rights, which this Authority still owns,  
16 manages.

17 We have an organization that's  
18 separated into two distinct divisions. We have  
19 treatment, which occurs in Pleasantville, New Jersey  
20 off of the reservoir in the wells. And that water is  
21 pumped into Atlantic City via the two 48-inch mains  
22 coming across the causeway, and distribution is  
23 handled out of this facility here, "distribution"  
24 meaning getting the water out through the pipes and  
25 into the homes, making the repairs, the adjustments,

1 the metering and so forth and so on. It's quite an  
2 undertaking by our staff, and I am blessed to have  
3 such competent staff and a great Board to guide in my  
4 exercise.

5 But certainly we want to welcome you  
6 and give you every opportunity to learn more about  
7 the system. As I indicated in my letter, I will be  
8 available to take you on tours whenever, you know, it  
9 meets with your schedule. So welcome aboard.

10 MS. BAILEY: Thank you.

11 MR. CHEATHAM: Thank you.

12 MR. HILL: Would either one of you like  
13 to make a statement or have anything to say?

14 MR. CHEATHAM: I'm a talkative person.  
15 Better watch when you ask me to say something.

16 MR. COLANZI: But he's an honest one.

17 MR. HILL: That I know too.

18 MR. CHEATHAM: And my wife says, What  
19 are you getting yourself into?

20 More stuff, I said, but only because I  
21 love Atlantic City.

22 MR. HILL: We know that.

23 MR. CHEATHAM: I get involved and I get  
24 involved in such a way that I express my emotions.  
25 And when I got appointed to this MUA, I'm saying to

1 myself, That's the water. That's the most important  
2 part of our existence, the water.

3 So you know, I don't know, I was  
4 shocked when they said that I was going to have to  
5 vote on anything today, so I hope I'm voting the  
6 right way. I'm going to vote against anybody taking  
7 the water away from us.

8 MR. HILL: Mr. Lea will keep you in  
9 shape and we admire your service to our community, as  
10 well as Ms. Bailey.

11 MS. BAILEY: I've known Mr. Cheatham  
12 since I was a little pup. He is a lover of Atlantic  
13 City, without a doubt. I've tried to follow in his  
14 footprint. We worked together as Board Members for  
15 the Atlantic City Free Public Library and I am  
16 president of the board of education. We have a good  
17 cooperative relationship, so we all know Atlantic  
18 City is going through a great change right now and I  
19 don't think there is anybody at this table that is  
20 not in love with Atlantic City because you would not  
21 be here, and I am in love with Atlantic City, so I  
22 hope whatever I do here can be an inspiration, like  
23 someone as Mr. Cheatham has been an inspiration to  
24 me, helping to give back.

25 I'm a recent retiree. My grandkids are

1 eating up most of my time, but for what's left over,  
2 I truly pledge to be here as often as I can and in  
3 any way I can assist.

4 MR. HILL: Thank you. We'll move on to  
5 correspondence.

6 MR. WARD: No correspondence.

7 MR. HILL: Wow, that's amazing.  
8 Financial report.

9 MR. WARD: Is attached. Any questions?

10 MS. BAZEMORE: I just want to briefly  
11 bring everybody up to speed on a few things regarding  
12 the reports that were sent out. We had our meeting  
13 with our auditors right before this meeting, and one  
14 comment that we talked about, unrestricted reserves,  
15 available monies. So on the cash management report  
16 that was sent currently states that we have a \$12.2  
17 million number, but most of that is money set aside  
18 for projects and reserve for debt service and so  
19 forth. But that unrestricted number of that balance  
20 is about \$7 million, so I did want to report that  
21 information.

22 In addition to that in your statements,  
23 the balance sheet, one item that sticks out when I  
24 did the review, I wanted to comment on has to do with  
25 our receivable balance. We're currently at \$1.2

1 million receivable balance as of February. All of  
2 our reports that were submitted to you are as of  
3 February. However, last year our receivable balance  
4 was about 900,000, so I did some analysis and review  
5 to try to take a look at what caused the increase,  
6 because on our balance sheet is, that's important, is  
7 our cash and receivable balance. And upon review, it  
8 was determined that the Trump properties is the main  
9 issue.

10 MR. HILL: Is the one issue?

11 MS. BAZEMORE: Which is about \$140,000  
12 when they filed bankruptcy. And you guys remember  
13 the situation where the numbers were sent over to the  
14 City and it wasn't included in the sale, so it still  
15 shows on our balance sheet as a receivable. However,  
16 it is listed on the City's records as special  
17 charges. So we do expect to collect that amount. So  
18 that explains that fluctuation on our balance sheet.

19 Overall for the year, our revenues  
20 versus last year appear to be up about 83,000. I  
21 wanted to report that 20,000 is from additional  
22 billing, and the other advantage is the fact that we  
23 did have the connection fee for Florida Enterprises  
24 earlier this year, about 25,000. So that has support  
25 of what the increase is, as well our connection fee

1 that we received.

2 The expenses for the year appear to be  
3 down. After review, it was determined that's because  
4 we had the white collar retro payment last February  
5 of 2014, which was a about \$120,000 when we paid that  
6 out, so that explains the decline in expenses versus  
7 last year. So overall we're looking good and we're  
8 trudging along and I'll continue to keep you updated  
9 as to where we stand.

10 MR. WARD: Shut off list is available.  
11 Any questions on shut offs?

12 MR. HILL: Again, you might want to  
13 share when we do shut offs to the new Board Members.

14 MR. WARD: Mr. Moyle, shut offs?

15 MR. HILL: When generally?

16 MS. BAZEMORE: From November 15th to  
17 March 15th, the moratorium for the BPU, which we're  
18 not under, is what we typically use, that range,  
19 where we do not shut the customers off.

20 MS. BAILEY: Okay.

21 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Has the American Demo  
22 been satisfied?

23 MS. BAZEMORE: They set up a payment  
24 arrangement and their first payment was to begin in  
25 March, a small amount after going back and forth, but

1 yes, they did make their payment. They have, I think  
2 a year.

3 MR. MCGETTIGAN: So they don't remain  
4 on there as owed?

5 MS. BAZEMORE: No.

6 MR. MCGETTIGAN: We lifted them?

7 MR. WARD: As long as they're staying  
8 current.

9 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Thank you.

10 MR. WARD: Personnel committee meeting.  
11 The meeting minutes are attached. I would like to  
12 add that we have a footnote on the resignation of  
13 Mr. Kunigelis, who was a young, very very talented  
14 chemist in our laboratory over at the plant. The  
15 young man decided he was going to the big city, moved  
16 to Chicago, so we have a search for chemist. My  
17 human resources director has indicated that the pool  
18 of candidates is starting to look good. We're  
19 getting some young candidates that have the  
20 appropriate training and also experience, so we  
21 should be narrowing down our interviews and coming  
22 forward with a recommendation to replace the chemist.  
23 We also have a footnote on our  
24 distribution area with respect to the upcoming  
25 resignation of Mr. Megella. Mike Megella is our

1 director of -- distribution manager, very talented,  
2 very seasoned. And we began with our search for an  
3 assistant director in that position and I think what  
4 is revealed is that the pool of candidates with the  
5 requisite experience is slim, and it may have  
6 something to do with the trends in young people  
7 growing up with Nintendo and Facebook as opposed to  
8 screw drivers, hammers and plumbing equipment. So  
9 we're going to continue, because these are technical  
10 areas that we need to cover.

11 Tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock we have  
12 a meeting with the special improvement district of  
13 the CRDA, as well as the representative from Atlantic  
14 City Fire Department. We are joining in undertaking  
15 to paint hydrants in the City, and the fire hydrants  
16 on the boardwalk are the first hydrants that we will  
17 begin with. We needed 60 degree weather, the  
18 appropriate paint, the appropriate cut-outs, so we  
19 seem to be moving that project well along.

20 Also I'm happy to report that the  
21 Authority will be participating in the Earth Day  
22 ceremony. This is the ceremony that the Atlantic  
23 County Utilities Authority puts on. I understand  
24 there is about 100 vendors that come, but our staff  
25 is putting together a list of displays, one of which

1 is a piece of wooden pipe because water used to be  
2 distributed by wooden pipe in the City of Atlantic  
3 City, so we have a little history. We're going show  
4 some meters, we're going to show some things that  
5 begin to bring people in touch with the process of  
6 bringing clean water.

7 There is no engineering committee  
8 report at this time. The engineering committee  
9 meeting --

10 MR. HILL: We'll meet next week. What  
11 is it, Wednesday, Mr. Lea? We meet next week.

12 MS. JOHNSON: Wednesday, April 22nd.

13 MR. WARD: The new consumer confidence  
14 reports are available. I want to thank our chief  
15 staff engineer, Mr. Claude Smith, who is sitting  
16 here, who diligently provides us the exercise of  
17 putting together the CCR. The CCR is a requirement  
18 from the United States Environmental Protection  
19 Agency to release to the public the indicators of  
20 quality in our water. And so we will have many of  
21 these also out at the Earth Day ceremony, as well as  
22 other information.

23 And that would conclude my report.  
24 Director's Forum?

25 MR. HILL: Director's Forum, from the

1 Directors itself, welcome both of you.

2 Any other Director's comments? Okay,  
3 public participation. We already did that. I don't  
4 see any other public here.

5 Old Business, which we're at 7 now, Old  
6 Business. Accepting bids, this is 7.a.(1), water  
7 service laterals. Anything on this, Garth?

8 MR. MOYLE: We're not bidding, we're  
9 rebidding.

10 MR. HILL: So we're going to rebid for  
11 this, so we still have to vote on the rebid?

12 MR. MOYLE: Yes.

13 MR. MCGETTIGAN: I'll make a motion for  
14 rebid.

15 MS. BAZEMORE: It was 25 percent over  
16 the previous amount, so we thought it would be in the  
17 best interest of the Authority to rebid it.

18 MR. HILL: We have a motion. Do we

7 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: On the ASR well --

8 MR. WARD: Please explain what an ASR  
9 well is.

10 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: It's our actual  
11 storage aquifer, storage recharge well. Basically,  
12 it's set up just like a regular well. We're pumping  
13 water in and have it stored at that particular  
14 location and pump it back out when it's actually  
15 needed. We expect to use it during our peak summer  
16 months, which is anywhere from June up to about  
17 August or September of the year. So other months  
18 we're actually pumping water in for storage, like I  
19 said, and use it after that time period. The  
20 building sits over by public works department, right  
21 off of Route 40. You can actually drive by and see  
22 that little brown building. It's lit up at night and  
23 that's the location of that particular well. It's  
24 pretty much our only well that's in the City of  
25 Atlantic City that we utilize.

1                   Just to go on further, the project  
2 right now, it's still in progress. When I say still  
3 in progress: I do have a meeting set up with the  
4 contractor sometime in the next two weeks to kind of  
5 finalize receiving all of our spare parts equipment.

6                   We still have some other portions of  
7 the project that we need to iron out, which is the  
8 control and instrumentation portion of it. We did  
9 speak -- or I did speak to OCC, which is the  
10 contractor, subcontractor that's doing that  
11 particular work. Right now, they're in a standstill  
12 in regards to coming to the location and doing some  
13 additional work, so I am waiting to hear back from  
14 them. As soon as I do, then I'll let that be known  
15 in terms of what our progress is on that portion of  
16 it. Thank you.

17                   MR. BOR: Just information.

18                   MR. HILL: Thank you, Mr. Smith.

19                   MR. WARD: Next 8.b.(1). 8.b.(1) we're  
20 soliciting permission to solicit bids for janitor  
21 services, and that would be here at this facility,  
22 the administration facility in Atlantic City.

23                   MR. HILL: This is a one-year contract?

24                   MR. MOYLE: It can go two if they agree  
25 to keep the same price.

18 Ford, Scott and they're working very closely with the  
19 Authority here, Linda particularly and Mr. Ward, and  
20 our audit is here and all of our Board Members got  
21 this. If anyone has a question, if you weren't here  
22 at the meeting, but for the new Board Members, we  
23 have a very good audit and I want to thank you,  
24 Linda, and our department. We have a good clean  
25 audit. We're in good financial shape versus other

1 things in our area, so we're in good shape so we're  
2 going to need to approve this officially.

25 the country and bundle it.

1 MS. BAZEMORE: That's the demand  
2 response is the next one. This is EMEX. This is --  
3 this will give us the ability to do an online  
4 purchase for supply, electric supply. Our electric  
5 contract expires in June, so this will give us an  
6 ability to do an online auction, which is scheduled  
7 for the day before the Board in May. We'll get  
8 pricing for our load, for electricity, for a two-year  
9 period.

10 MR. MCGETTIGAN: For us to bid?

11 MS. BAZEMORE: For us to bid.

12 MR. WARD: And that electricity is  
13 brokered nationally. So for example they have  
14 hydroelectric power in Oregon and if you get a good  
15 melt-off and all of a sudden you have a lot of water  
16 coming through the dams, they have excess electricity  
17 that can be brokered and sold for a discount and  
18 brokered. All of this is about savings.

19 MS. BAZEMORE: The final rate will be  
20 brought before the Board at the next meeting and it's  
21 our option as to whether or not we want to enter into  
22 a contract. We've been gone from the utility at  
23 least five years now, and it's always been to our  
24 benefit to get pricing elsewhere, so this gives us  
25 the opportunity to actually do the online processing

1 to get pricing.

2 MR. MCGETTIGAN: So we're bidding to a  
3 broker, not individual companies that sell?

4 MS. BAZEMORE: It actually is an online  
5 platform where they have vendors across the country  
6 and they know our load and they determine whether or  
7 not they're interested in, you know, purchasing a  
8 load for us. And you actually see the prices, you  
9 know, popping up, Hess or whoever, and at the end of  
10 the auction whatever price was the best price is what  
11 we're able to.

12 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Then our contract is  
13 with the company?

14 MS. BAZEMORE: With the company, yes.

15 MR. MCGETTIGAN: Selling us the load?

16 MS. BAZEMORE: We have PPL that would  
17 be expiring right now.

18 MR. HILL: Motion to accept?

14 response unit whereby when we are notified that the  
15 grid is going to have stress, we back off some of our  
16 power, but we get paid for being a partner with the  
17 grid. So we're going to get paid on this, so we need  
18 to move forward.

19 MR. HILL: Motion?

20 MR. MCGETTIGAN: I'll make the motion.

11 reduced, there is a possibility to bypass that and  
12 have them actually do work during that time period.

13 MS. BAZEMORE: The funding, I think the  
14 funding will be available the spring of 2016.

15 MR. HILL: Next year.

16 MR. MCGETTIGAN: We can design graphics  
17 and cost will be added to this company?

18 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: It would be a part  
19 of the entire bid process.

20 MR. WARD: We'll be more careful.

21 MR. HILL: Very careful who we select,  
22 Claude.

23 MR. CLAUDE SMITH: I don't think we're  
24 going to be going out for any graphics for design.

25 MR. HILL: No, we might be able to do

8 actually getting some revenues, that's a different  
9 story.

10 MR. WARD: Or Revel?

11 MR. HILL: Just kidding.
