4 MR. HILL: Adequate notice of this meeting  
5 has been provided as required by law by mailing  
6 to the Press a list of the regularly scheduled  
7 meeting, March 26th, 2021 at 404 North Virginia  
8 Avenue, conference room and via Zoom, Atlantic  
9 City, New Jersey.

10 A copy of said notice was sent to the city  
11 clerk to be posted. All of this aforesaid  
12 complies with Chapter 231 of the Laws of 1975  
13 known as the "Open Public Meetings Law."

14 MR. BOR: Thank you. If I can take a roll  
15 call. Ms. Bailey.

16 MS. BAILEY: Here.

17 MR. BOR: Mr. Banfield.

18 MR. BANFIELD: Here.

19 MR. BOR: Mr. Hill.

20 MR. HILL: Here.

21 MR. BOR: Ms. Langford I understand will  
22 be joining us shortly. And Mr. Devlin.

23 THE CHAIRMAN: Good morning.

24 MR. BOR: Oh, and Mr. Dedar. I'm sorry,  
25 sir. Mr. Dedar.

1 MR. DEDAR: Yes.

2 MR. BOR: Okay. Thank you. And lastly,  
3 Mr. Chairman, the record should reflect I heard  
4 from Mr. Gallagher who will be joining us under  
5 number six. And if we can now do a flag  
6 salute.

7 MS. JOHNSON: One second, gentlemen. Mr.  
8 Cheatham, we are trying to get him by phone.

9 MR. BOR: Okay.

10 THE CHAIRMAN: And you know what, can we  
11 reach Ms. Langford by phone too? If she  
12 doesn't come in in the next few minutes I think  
13 that will behoove us.

14 MR. BOR: And for the record, I made the  
15 roll call and Ms. Langford is now present. Is  
16 that correct, ma'am?

17 MR. HILL: And on mute.

18 THE CHAIRMAN: Do we have a quorum?

19 THE BOARD MEMBER: Yes, we do.

20 THE CHAIRMAN: All right. Well, let's  
21 move forward--

22 MR. BOR: Mr. Chairman, Mr. Cheatham will  
23 be calling in--

24 THE CHAIRMAN: Yes, that's fine.

25 MR. BOR: We have already taken roll call

1 and we are ready for flag salute. I am not  
2 there. Mr. Devlin, could you have the flag  
3 salute for us?

4 THE CHAIRMAN: Sure.

5 - - -

6 (Whereupon the Pledge of Allegiance was  
7 recited.)

8 - - -

9 THE CHAIRMAN: Thanks everybody.

10 MR. BOR: That being the case, Mr.  
11 Chairman, number four relates to the regular  
12 and executive session minutes that have been  
13 attributed. If there is any issues anyone  
14 wishes to discuss on the board, please do so.  
15 If not, is there a motion to approve the  
16 regular and executive session minutes?

17 THE CHAIRMAN: That's a motion from me,  
18 John Devlin.

19 MR. HILL: Second.

20 MR. BOR: Ms. Bailey.

21 MS. BAILEY: Yes.

22 MR. BOR: Mr. Banfield.

23 MR. BANFIELD: Yes.

24 MR. BOR: Mr. Hill.

25 MR. HILL: Yes.

1 MR. BOR: And Mr. Devlin.

2 THE CHAIRMAN: Yes. Thank you.

3 MR. BOR: Okay. Also the record should  
4 reflect that we certainly welcome Mr. Dedar as  
5 a commissioner. But I received communication  
6 yesterday that it certainly has not been  
7 clarified yet his-- he is a commission, but  
8 whether he is going to be a member or an  
9 alternate.

10 But clearly the record should indicate  
11 that Ms. Bailey is with us today and she has  
12 full voting rights until that issue can be  
13 resolved.

14 THE CHAIRMAN: Good morning, Ms. Bailey.

15 MS. BAILEY: Good morning.

16 MR. BOR: Good morning.

17 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

18 MR. BOR: Director's report. Any director  
19 have any comments they wish to present?

20 MR. ARMSTRONG: Yes. You are talking  
21 about me, right? Correct? I just want to make  
22 sure.

23 THE CHAIRMAN: You're the director.

24 MR. BOR: You're the director.

25 MR. ARMSTRONG: Well, he said any

1 director. That's what threw me off. The--  
2 with respect to personnel, we just have one  
3 item that I want to discuss in open session.  
4 And that item is with respect to the renewal of  
5 the Delta Dental plan.

6 There was a-- we are up for renewal. The  
7 plan requires that we execute it, I believe, by  
8 April 1st. Is that correct, Anita? I can't  
9 hear you.

10 MS. THAPA: Oh, I'm sorry. Yes.

11 MR. ARMSTRONG: Yes. And it is going to  
12 be somewhat of an increase of two percent.  
13 That cost overall is nominal, but I think is  
14 in-- somewhere in the neighborhood, I believe  
15 we said, of about four or \$500, Anita.

16 And it is something that is required. And  
17 we will, in order to continue with the plan, we  
18 need to at some point have a motion to allow us  
19 to renew the Delta Dental plan for all  
20 employees.

21 MS. THAPA: The estimate is just as an  
22 increase because the Delta Dental cost is based  
23 on the claims. So we don't know how many, you  
24 know, claims in a year. So that's just an  
25 estimate for now, two percent increase.



1           MR. BOR: Now, Mr. Armstrong, do you want  
2           to have a motion today to renew the dental  
3           plan?

4           MR. ARMSTRONG: Yes.

5           MR. BOR: Okay. And as the agenda  
6           indicated, you have your own category, Mr.  
7           Armstrong, executive director's report. So you  
8           are in two places.

9           MR. ARMSTRONG: Well, that's why I asked.  
10          That's exactly why I asked.

11          MR. BOR: Any other director that wishes  
12          to make some comments before the board?

13          THE CHAIRMAN: Hey, Fred and to the board  
14          and to-- real quickly, I normally get a  
15          phonecall or some communication prior to our  
16          board meeting. And normally I have a spot to  
17          chat. I just want to do a little housekeeping.

18          One is I definitely would appreciate a  
19          call prior to the meeting or prior to the  
20          minutes or the resolution being posted. There  
21          was some comments that I did have. And I  
22          wanted to do some housekeeping. Fred, would  
23          this be the appropriate time to chat or do you  
24          want me to wait?

25          MR. BOR: It depends what items. Is

1           there--

2           THE CHAIRMAN:   Just overall items.  One  
3           being, again, I normally get a call prior to  
4           the agenda being made up for questions or if I  
5           I wanted to add something to the agenda, any  
6           kind of resolutions or if I had comments.  I  
7           never received that communication.

8           Normally I receive it from Kelley who has  
9           been our board secretary since I have been on  
10          the board.  I did get a communication from  
11          Kelley saying that we no longer-- she no longer  
12          does that, we were not to communicate with her.  
13          That we were supposed to communicate with  
14          Stella I believe.  Would that be--

15          MR. ARMSTRONG:  No.

16          THE CHAIRMAN:  I'm sorry?

17          MR. ARMSTRONG:  No.  That's not the way  
18          the process went.

19          THE CHAIRMAN:  Well, okay.

20          MR. ARMSTRONG:  But we can talk about it  
21          when you let me know when you are ready.

22          THE CHAIRMAN:  Well, okay.  Let me finish.  
23          I did receive a communication from Kelley.  I  
24          was speaking to her regarding agenda items and  
25          she was told she got direction from the

1 executive director, you Mr. Armstrong, telling  
2 her that to no longer communicate with her.  
3 That I should be communicating with Stella. I  
4 have it in an email. I can read it back  
5 verbatim.

6 I have-- that's a twofold issue I have a  
7 twofold with. One is I like to be transparent  
8 with our employees. If I feel as I need to  
9 communicate with an employee, that should be on  
10 me.

11 And two is who made the decision? I know  
12 Ms. Stella is like a part-time employee. I  
13 know she was only temporary. Who put her in  
14 charge of that and when did that change? And  
15 why wasn't I communicated with?

16 The only communication I got was from  
17 Kelley and an email that was very cold  
18 basically telling me not to communicate with  
19 her, if I need questions I can direct them  
20 towards you or I can direct them towards  
21 Stella.

22 And with that being said, I did contact  
23 you, Mr. Armstrong. And I have a email I can  
24 read back verbatim where I asked you. I said  
25 hey, you know, we are going back and forth in

1 emails a little bit. I would rather set up  
2 face to face or a Zoom meeting, please set up a  
3 contact. That never happened.

4 So since I have been on the board one of  
5 the big things I have always pushed for and  
6 strived for as a leader, and Ms. Bailey and Ms.  
7 Langford can attest, I have been on many, many  
8 boards throughout the city. I have been  
9 chairman and president of many, many boards. I  
10 have always stressed communication,  
11 transparency.

12 And it seems as though-- and I'm not  
13 trying to pick on you-- since you have come  
14 here you have eliminated some things that one,  
15 we didn't discuss as a board and two is we  
16 didn't agree on.

17 And again, communication with me is huge.  
18 I have a long list of military background. I  
19 have a long list of police background and law  
20 enforcement background where communication is  
21 key. And I have a long list of being on the  
22 Board of Education and president for three or  
23 four of those years.

24 So you know, one of the reasons I have  
25 been successful has been communication and

1 transparency. And I feel as though-- and maybe  
2 it's a mistake, I don't know-- that I have lost  
3 something in transition here. And I want it  
4 back. And I want to be able to say hey, who is  
5 our contact person.

6 And I want to be able to communicate with  
7 you because there is some things that are, you  
8 know, pertinent in this environment and our  
9 neighborhoods and our communities that-- I  
10 mean, I understand you don't live here. But we  
11 hear it everyday from neighbors and leaders  
12 around the city, questions and problems and  
13 issues that may arise.

14 I need to be able to talk to, you know, if  
15 not you then who is our board secretary. And  
16 if you change the board secretary, why weren't  
17 we told? So it is a little frustrating on my  
18 end when I didn't even get a call. We are  
19 putting an agenda together and I don't get any  
20 kind of call.

21 I get an email-- as a matter of fact, I  
22 had two phonecalls into our board secretary  
23 that was Kelley Williams since I have been on  
24 the board. And I finally got an email response  
25 saying not to contact her anymore per your

1 request and if I had any questions to talk to  
2 Stella or you.

3 That should have come from you, Mr.  
4 Armstrong, not from our board secretary. And  
5 if there was a change the whole board should  
6 know.

7 MR. ARMSTRONG: Are you ready for me to  
8 respond or are you--

9 THE CHAIRMAN: Yes. I mean, if you want  
10 to respond you can. I was--

11 MR. ARMSTRONG: I do want to respond. I  
12 do want to respond. Because that-- most of us  
13 what you said is not accurate.

14 THE CHAIRMAN: Well, I mean, I have the  
15 emails.

16 MR. ARMSTRONG: Okay. But let me get a  
17 chance to respond because I have emails too.  
18 You just let me know when you want me to  
19 respond.

20 THE CHAIRMAN: Well, you can respond. But  
21 when you are telling me I'm wrong, I don't feel  
22 as though I am wrong. And I have emails to,  
23 you know--

24 MR. ARMSTRONG: Okay. But you are not  
25 going to know-- I said most of what you said

1 was inaccurate. And the only way for me--  
2 there's two sides to every story.

3 The only way-- you are telling me how you  
4 have heard it from other people, but you  
5 haven't heard it from me. This is my  
6 opportunity for you to hear it from me.

7 THE CHAIRMAN: Well, I think we should  
8 have had the opportunity prior to this, Mr.  
9 Armstrong. To be--

10 MR. ARMSTRONG: Are you saying you don't  
11 want to hear me respond?

12 THE CHAIRMAN: I think-- now you are  
13 cutting me off. I think it should have  
14 happened. I think this conversation should  
15 have happened prior to today's meeting. That's  
16 what I'm saying to you.

17 MR. ARMSTRONG: Do you want to hear me  
18 respond is my question.

19 THE CHAIRMAN: It's up to you. I mean--

20 MR. ARMSTRONG: Then I would like to  
21 respond. You just let me know when.

22 THE CHAIRMAN: Go ahead.

23 THE BOARD MEMBER: All right. First of  
24 all, there needs to be clarification of your  
25 role and my role with respect to the

1 organization and the way the organizations run.

2 My experience and my understanding of how  
3 the board operates with respect to an executive  
4 director appears to be very different than  
5 yours. And I was going to raise this issue as  
6 well with respect to how boards communicate  
7 with employees, how chairmans communicate with  
8 employees.

9 It has not been my experience after 31  
10 years of dealing with boards, consulting  
11 boards, giving boards legal advise with respect  
12 to how boards operate, with respect to almost  
13 30 years of parliamentary experience with  
14 boards, boards of every kind that you can  
15 imagine, the utility authority's attorney, I  
16 have been a board to the housing authority, I  
17 have been a board attorney to just about every  
18 kind of public entity you can imagine.

19 I was even attorney counsel to the senate  
20 for ten years where I gave them advice on  
21 parliamentary procedures as well. So I do  
22 understand the direction that should be given  
23 directly from a board member to the employees.  
24 So there is clarification with respect to that.  
25 I do know where the line is drawn in the sand.



1           Now my understanding is that as a  
2           chairman, chairman means you chair the board  
3           meetings. That's the limitation of the  
4           chairman's role, not that the chairman has  
5           direct communications with board employees and  
6           give direction to employees.

7           THE CHAIRMAN: Mike--

8           MR. ARMSTRONG: Let me-- Mr. Chairman, I  
9           gave you the respect. I did not interrupt you.  
10          And I--

11          THE CHAIRMAN: You are going beyond--

12          MR. ARMSTRONG: Mr. Chairman--

13          THE CHAIRMAN: I read your resume--

14          MR. ARMSTRONG: Mr. Devlin, I would like  
15          to finish my statement on--

16          THE CHAIRMAN: You don't have to--

17          MR. ARMSTRONG: But Mr. Devlin, I would  
18          like to finish my-- I think in fairness  
19          everybody should hear me like I heard you.

20          THE CHAIRMAN: I heard you. But let's  
21          keep it to--

22          MR. ARMSTRONG: Let me finish my statement  
23          because you said a lot of things about  
24          something that I did and something that you  
25          claimed that I caused since I have been here.

1 I think in fairness to this board I should have  
2 the opportunity to respond.

3 THE CHAIRMAN: Mike, please respond. I  
4 got your background. We did, you know--

5 THE CHAIRMAN: Okay. But they don't--  
6 there are two new board members here, Mr.  
7 Chairman, who do not know that. They deserve  
8 to hear.

9 THE CHAIRMAN: I am talking to you right  
10 now. I would like to hear an answer and  
11 direction why we are not-- we don't have  
12 transparency--

13 MR. ARMSTRONG: And I am going to give you  
14 that if you stop-- if you let me explain, I  
15 will tell you. Now, you indicated that you--  
16 this was something that I told her to do.

17 We had a conversation with respect to-- at  
18 the last board meeting that you would-- the  
19 board would consider getting a board secretary.  
20 And we had a conversation that that person that  
21 you would consider would be Stella. That's in  
22 the minutes. We can look at the transcript.

23 THE CHAIRMAN: That was the personnel  
24 committee.

25 MR. ARMSTRONG: You-- no, it was also

1 mentioned in the board meeting and it's in the  
2 board meeting minutes.

3 THE CHAIRMAN: I recall it being--

4 MR. ARMSTRONG: We went back and we talked  
5 to Stella pursuant to our discussions at the  
6 board meeting, okay. And you indicated at the  
7 last board meeting for me to look into that. I  
8 did so. We communicated with Stella. Stella  
9 sent you an email saying that she was  
10 interested in a position.

11 In that process Stella was communicating  
12 she said that she wanted to get involved so  
13 that she can determine whether or not she  
14 wanted to take over that position. And I said  
15 if you are interested you need to communicate  
16 directly with the chairman.

17 That's why she sent you an email because  
18 she wanted to let you know after she was  
19 experiencing some of these duties that she--  
20 whether or not she would be interested in  
21 pursuing that. You received that email.

22 Now, when you indicated that an email was  
23 sent from-- you sent an email to me saying that  
24 you wanted to communicate with respect to why I  
25 told the particular person not-- or Kelley not

1 to communicate with you, that's not the nature  
2 of your email. So if you want to read it back,  
3 read it back.

4 THE CHAIRMAN: I will.

5 MR. ARMSTRONG: The nature of your email--  
6 well, no. The nature of your email was about  
7 the communication that we were having about  
8 hiring individuals and when my schedule was  
9 going move.

10 And you said to me if, in fact, you  
11 weren't satisfied with the way the process and  
12 the procedure by which I said I was going to  
13 move forward as the executive director. You  
14 wanted to tell me how to move forward and  
15 recommended to me that I communicate with you  
16 about how I should do it so you can save me  
17 time.

18 THE CHAIRMAN: Mike-- Mike--

19 MR. ARMSTRONG: That's what you said.

20 THE CHAIRMAN: Okay. You are way out of  
21 that conversation. And this is exactly why I  
22 said Mike, let's have a communication--

23 MR. ARMSTRONG: Most of our conversations  
24 are in emails anyway.

25 THE CHAIRMAN: Yeah, I see that. Because

1           you don't respond when I say hey, Mike, let's--  
2           this is a bad-- you are starting out really  
3           bad not being able to even communicate with  
4           your executive director, okay. Don't get me  
5           wrong--

6           MR. ARMSTRONG: I'm starting out bad?

7           THE CHAIRMAN: Yes, you are starting out  
8           bad. I don't feel comfortable with you not  
9           responding to an email for a Zoom meeting.

10          I know you're meeting with other board  
11          members. I am the chairman. I would like to  
12          sit down and talk with you, maybe bring you up  
13          to speed on where we have been the last year  
14          and a half I have been on the board. You don't  
15          even give the respect to return that call.

16          MR. ARMSTRONG: No the--

17          THE CHAIRMAN: I mean--

18          MR. ARMSTRONG: No, it wasn't-- you  
19          indicated to me that you wanted to tell me how  
20          to do my job.

21          THE CHAIRMAN: Mike-- stop it, Mike.

22          MR. ARMSTRONG: Read the emails.

23          THE CHAIRMAN: Mike-- stop it, Mike.

24          MR. ARMSTRONG: Read the email. You said  
25          you wanted to read it, read it.

1 THE CHAIRMAN: Mike, I wrote the email. I  
2 don't need to-- stop it, Mike. I am not  
3 telling you what to do.

4 MR. ARMSTRONG: No, you-- listen--

5 THE CHAIRMAN: I was humbly asking--

6 MR. ARMSTRONG: I know my  
7 responsibilities--

8 MS. BAILEY: Excuse me. Excuse me. I am  
9 sorry to interrupt. But this is supposed to be  
10 a-- John, this is supposed to be a--

11 THE CHAIRMAN: Ms. Bailey, with all due  
12 respect, I am the chairman. And I am asking a  
13 question.

14 MS. BAILEY: John, I know you are. But  
15 this is a public session.

16 THE CHAIRMAN: That's fine. And if he  
17 wants to conduct himself that way in public,  
18 that's fine. I am the chairman. Please give  
19 me the floor.

20 I have asked for a Zoom meeting to speak  
21 about agendas and stuff that was going on the  
22 last year and a half of the time that I have  
23 been on the board and I didn't get that  
24 respect. Things were happening around this  
25 committee and around this MUA that are going

1 on. There is no transparency and no  
2 communication.

3 Now I apologize for the frustration in my  
4 voice, but I have been respectful. And Mike, I  
5 humbly asked you for a Zoom meeting. And you  
6 don't-- if you are scared to talk to me-- like  
7 you just said, that's why you email. Okay, I  
8 am not going to--

9 MR. ARMSTRONG: I am not scared to talk to  
10 you. I think we need to have an understanding  
11 of what your role is. In terms of what my  
12 responsibility is-- I think due to your  
13 experience you believe that you are the  
14 executive director as well and that you tell me  
15 what my--

16 THE CHAIRMAN: Mike, you are just  
17 fabricating stuff and that's okay. You can  
18 just--

19 MR. ARMSTRONG: Okay, well-- all right,  
20 whatever you--

21 THE CHAIRMAN: I think you are confused  
22 and that's okay. I never--

23 MR. ARMSTRONG: I know my responsibility.

24 THE CHAIRMAN: I never told you what to do  
25 in your job. I don't care what you do in your

1 job. I humbly asked to please communicate with  
2 me so I can communicate and do my job, Mike,  
3 and communicate with the rest of the board.  
4 That's my job. And let me know what we are  
5 doing, okay, where we are at, where we stand.

6 That's what I have done. I have done it  
7 for almost 20 years in this town. And I will  
8 continue to do it that way.

9 I am not trying to tell you what to do,  
10 how to do your job, okay. So if somebody put  
11 that in your head or if you have that kind of  
12 idea in your head, you are very, very wrong.  
13 You can ask everybody around that table  
14 including Ms. Bailey if I have ever been a part  
15 of that. It's a no.

16 So let's come back to where I was. I  
17 asked for a Zoom meeting just to bring you up  
18 to speed to where I have been for the last year  
19 and a half and maybe we can save some time on  
20 some things. I did have some questions. You  
21 obviously had some questions. Maybe there is  
22 concerns.

23 And Mike, I do respect your background. I  
24 do respect your legal background. I know who  
25 you are. But in the same token, if we can't



1 work together and communicate, and we can agree  
2 to disagree, this is going to be a long year.  
3 And that's all I am saying.

4 I would humbly respect and appreciate if  
5 you could communicate with me, the chairman, as  
6 of now. I might not be chairman next year.  
7 But as of now, can you please communicate with  
8 me before you make decisions especially when it  
9 has to do with the agenda. I had questions on  
10 the agenda. I don't know who to communicate  
11 with.

12 I have the email. I will share it with  
13 you. It said it was from you to Kelley not to  
14 communicate with her anymore. I have an issue  
15 with that. So that was my humble Zoom meeting  
16 that you didn't want to have with me. That's  
17 all I--

18 MR. ARMSTRONG: You are not giving me a  
19 chance to respond. I told you that was  
20 inaccurate--

21 THE CHAIRMAN: You responded.

22 MR. ARMSTRONG: I did not respond. You  
23 kept cutting me off. I did not respond.

24 THE CHAIRMAN: All right. Well, this is  
25 my meeting now, Mike. I heard you out. I

1 would really appreciate a Zoom meeting--

2 MR. ARMSTRONG: You didn't hear me out. I  
3 just want the other board members to know--

4 THE CHAIRMAN: Mike--

5 MR. ARMSTRONG: -- that I did not have an  
6 opportunity to respond.

7 THE CHAIRMAN: Mike, Mr. ED, I am the  
8 chairman of this committee, right. I am  
9 telling you we had this conversation. I would  
10 appreciate a Zoom meeting in the future and  
11 bring you up to speed of where we are going,  
12 what's your plan and what's your idea. That's  
13 it. So Fred, please continue the meeting.

14 MR. BOR: I have a suggestion to general  
15 counsel. Why don't we just make a commitment  
16 between the ED and the chairman to settle an in  
17 person or Zoom meeting within the next week and  
18 work out these issues rather than doing it at  
19 length at a public meeting.

20 Do I have the commitment from-- I assume I  
21 have the commitment from both of you that you  
22 will Zoom together within the week.

23 MS. JOHNSON: Excuse me, gentlemen.

24 Excuse me, gentlemen. There is someone trying  
25 to access. We believe it may be Dan

1 Gallagher's office. And Mr. Cheatham is now on  
2 the phone.

3 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

4 MS. JOHNSON: Well, we are not quite sure.  
5 That's the telephone number ending in 5900. Is  
6 that Mr. Gallagher's office?

7 MR. BOR: Yeah. Well, he's next on the  
8 agenda.

9 MS. WILLIAMS: That's Mr. Gallagher right  
10 there.

11 MS. JOHNSON: We are not sure who 5900 is.

12 MR. COLE: Ladies and gentlemen, it may  
13 very well be me. My name is Pat Cole and I am  
14 working in a support mechanism to Vince  
15 Polistina and to the engineering efforts.

16 MS. JOHNSON: Okay. So that's your number  
17 as well? That's your telephone ending in 5900  
18 as well?

19 MR. COLE: Yes, indeed.

20 MS. JOHNSON: Okay. Thank you.

21 MR. HILL: He is with H2M.

22 MS. JOHNSON: Okay. Thank you.

23 MR. BOR: Mr. Chairman, I believe the next  
24 agenda item is--

25 THE CHAIRMAN: Fred, just a sidebar. So

1 can we set up a meeting? I would like you  
2 there too and just a hello, how are you kind of  
3 thing, where we are going, communicate--

4 MR. ARMSTRONG: I ask that one other board  
5 member be present.

6 THE CHAIRMAN: Sure. I will make sure  
7 that happens. Fred, just arrange a schedule.

8 MR. BOR: Whatever Zoom meeting between  
9 you, the ED and another board member and  
10 myself, I will make myself available.

11 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Fred.

12 MR. BOR: Okay. The next-- can I move on  
13 the next item, Mr. Chairman?

14 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

15 MR. BOR: I believe Mr. Gallagher in on  
16 the phone. Are you there?

17 MR. HILL: Wait. Wait. Wait. Fred,  
18 Mr. Armstrong had a request for us to look at  
19 the dental thing. We never finished that  
20 topic.

21 MR. BOR: I thought we were going to have  
22 a motion on it.

23 MR. HILL: That's my point. We didn't do  
24 that.

25 MS. BAILEY: And I just had a question,

1 before we make the motion, to our finance  
2 person. Is Delta Dental, first of all, still  
3 the state plan? And the increase is based on  
4 usage and not an increase from the state? I am  
5 just asking that question for our finance  
6 person.

7 MS. THAPA: It is a annual renewal.

8 MS. BAILEY: Okay. So the increase is--

9 MS. THAPA: I am not sure about-- yeah, I  
10 am not sure about if it is a state plan or  
11 nothing. We always have Delta Dental plan with  
12 us.

13 MS. BAILEY: Okay.

14 MS. THAPA: We just automatically renew--  
15 I mean, not automatically. We renew every two  
16 years. So this is the time I guess.

17 MS. BAILEY: Okay. So this is the--

18 MR. ARMSTRONG: Debby actually explained  
19 to me that that was separate from the state  
20 plan.

21 MS. BAILEY: Okay.

22 MR. ARMSTRONG: That it's a separate plan.

23 MS. BAILEY: So it goes out every two  
24 years for RFP or something of that sort.

25 MR. BOR: Okay. So I take it, Pat, you

1 are requesting that we make a motion on 7 a.  
2 (1) the renewal?

3 MS. BAILEY: I just had a question--

4 MS. THAPA: That's just for the renewal.  
5 we don't have a resolution to go-- we are just  
6 asking the permission to renew it.

7 MR. ARMSTRONG: I understand because I  
8 asked the same question. Well, she is asking  
9 whether or not we flowed out a request for RFQ  
10 or quotes to determine whether or not this plan  
11 is the most feasible plan .

12 My understanding is that this has not been  
13 done in this case this time, but in the future  
14 is the intent to do that. We were just told  
15 that this is about to expire on April 1st.

16 MS. BAILEY: Okay.

17 MR. ARMSTRONG: So as a result I think it  
18 would behoove us to definitely go out in the  
19 future and consider plans that may be less  
20 expensive.

21 MS. BAILEY: Okay.

22 MS. THAPA: We could renew for one year  
23 then if that's the case then.

24 MR. ARMSTRONG: All right.

25 MS. BAILEY: Okay. Thank you. So does

1           that call for a motion, Mr. Bor?

2           MR. BOR:   And we are going to extend it  
3           just for one year.  Is that the sense of the  
4           board before we make the motion?  So the motion  
5           will be to renew Delta Dental for one year only  
6           while other options are being explored.  That's  
7           the understanding of the board.  Let's hear a  
8           motion.

9           THE CHAIRMAN:  I'll motion that.

10          MS. BAILEY:  I'll second it, John.

11          THE CHAIRMAN:  Thank you.

12          MR. BOR:   Ms. Bailey.

13          MS. BAILEY:  Yes.

14          MR. BOR:   Mr. Banfield.  Mr. Banfield.

15          THE BOARD MEMBER:  He's on mute.

16          MR. BANFIELD:  Yes.

17          MR. BOR:   Thank you, sir.  Mr. Hill.

18          MR. HILL:   Yes.

19          MR. BOR:   Ms. Langford.

20          MS. LANGFORD:  Yes.

21          MR. BOR:   And Mr. Devlin.

22          THE CHAIRMAN:  Yes.

23          MR. BOR:   That motion passes for one year.  
24                    At the same time Anita will ascertain whether  
25                    better plans could be available in the future.

1 Mr. Chairman, do you want to move on with the  
2 agenda?

3 THE CHAIRMAN: Yes. Number six, Fred. Do  
4 you have Mr. Gallagher or--

5 MR. BOR: Mr. Gallagher, are you there?

6 MS. WILLIAMS: I think he said he will be  
7 on at 11:00.

8 MR. BOR: Okay. Well, when he comes in we  
9 can just go right back to number six.

10 THE CHAIRMAN: Right. Number seven, Fred.

11 MR. BOR: Number seven is executive  
12 director report. Mr. Armstrong already  
13 discussed one of the personnel issues. Unless  
14 he has anything else, let's move on to  
15 engineering.

16 MR. ARMSTRONG: And with respect to that,  
17 Claude is going to speak to those engineering  
18 issues.

19 MR. SMITH: Yes. I invited-- good  
20 morning, everyone. I did send out an  
21 invitation to H2M and of course Mr. Polistina  
22 in regards to the project that we are working  
23 on for PFAS.

24 And it is very important that we get the  
25 information directly from H2M in regards to the



1 evaluations and pretty much the researches that  
2 were actually done and the options or  
3 alternatives that they are looking at in  
4 regards to combating our situation or scenario  
5 with PFAS.

6 With that being said, I will turn it over  
7 to Pat and Vince. They will be a tag team in  
8 regards to providing the board with some  
9 information based on the work that they have  
10 done so far and pretty much what will be  
11 pursued in the future in regards to this  
12 particular scenario.

13 MR. HILL: Just before they speak, I want  
14 to thank Claude and Michael for setting that  
15 up. At our engineering meeting we just had two  
16 weeks ago I requested bringing H2M in to give  
17 us an update, the whole board, with our  
18 consultant engineer's guidance of course. They  
19 have been working together.

20 This is a very, very serious issue that we  
21 are all facing. We know that. So I appreciate  
22 you arranging that, Claude. Because I think  
23 it's important especially for our new board  
24 members to hear that.

25 Also before we let them go, there was one

1 item not on the agenda-- I don't want to bring  
2 up the whole conversation we just had-- with  
3 engineering that we do need to at least address  
4 or discuss openly when we-- when we are done  
5 with this presentation.

6 So we have to add something to this. It's  
7 nothing major. It's something we have  
8 discussed at engineering. Thank you.

9 MR. SMITH: Pat and Vince--

10 MR. POLISTINA: We're here. Thanks,  
11 Claude. I am going to turn it right over to  
12 Pat just to give you an update from their  
13 perspective where they have done a lot of work  
14 over the last several months obviously as we  
15 previously discussed. And I will just let Pat  
16 kind of update you with where they are and  
17 where they are headed.

18 MR. COLE: Very good. Okay. Thank you,  
19 Vince. And to the board I say thank you for  
20 your time this morning in hearing out some of  
21 our efforts.

22 So Claude characterized the situation very  
23 well. We have been working in a team  
24 arrangement with Vince. And Vince has given  
25 us, you know, some incredible early access to

1 record information and some of the sort of  
2 operating and background history that  
3 additionally has been supported by your own  
4 internal engineering and operations leadership.

5 So the past couple months have been a real  
6 team effort and accelerated in some sense our  
7 ability to get to the point where we begin the  
8 process of data analysis and in particular,  
9 treatment alternatives analysis for you and for  
10 your consumers.

11 We have gone through a couple of the more  
12 traditional solutions to-- you know, to  
13 treating the family of contaminants that you  
14 are faced with now per fluorinated and per  
15 fluoroalkyl substances as it characterized, you  
16 know, kind of in the water quality literature.

17 And we have centered on an analysis of  
18 both the available flows that you have  
19 available to you and the points where treatment  
20 would be the most effective and have now gotten  
21 to the point where in the course of the next  
22 week or so we plan to issue a draft  
23 alternatives analysis to the MUA essentially to  
24 give you a road map for how to move forward  
25 both this year on an interim basis.

1           In other words, to give the MUA the  
2 potential to achieve compliance with the new  
3 regulatory standards that define how these  
4 types of contaminants are supposed to be  
5 treated and how to efficiently translate that  
6 into a permanent solution.

7           The immediate focus is on the use of  
8 granular activated carbon as a treatment  
9 mechanism. And for folks that are familiar  
10 with the traditional forms of treatment for  
11 contaminants of this nature, that will come as  
12 no surprise.

13           The reason why we are focused on that as a  
14 treatment solution is because we believe it  
15 will be the fastest to implement for the  
16 authority in the course of this year.

17           There will be future tense other forms of  
18 treatment and consideration that go into  
19 solving this problem in the long term. But we  
20 do believe in essence we have a roadmap for all  
21 the stakeholders to get to a point where  
22 compliance can be achieved this year.

23           MR. BOR: Thank you.

24           MR. COLE: You're welcome. I will be  
25 happy to take any questions.

1           MR. POLISTINA: And just to follow up on  
2 Pat, one of the things that we-- we had the  
3 initial call with DEP with the Department of  
4 Environmental Protection we mentioned before  
5 for the newer board members. We talked about  
6 this roadmap with the DEP.

7           One of the things the DEP requires, as Pat  
8 just indicated, is this alternatives analysis.  
9 That was the initial focus. And so we are, you  
10 know, working with the regulators in Trenton in  
11 developing the roadmap which we-- you know, Pat  
12 said we will have it in about another week.

13           And once we have it to the MUA and  
14 everybody is on the same page with it then we  
15 will be able to approach the regulators in  
16 Trenton again and kind of lay out where we are  
17 going.

18           Pat just indicated there is going to be  
19 some interim treatment at the well locations  
20 (inaudible) will be capital upgrades necessary  
21 at the plant. So it is kind of a two-step  
22 process.

23           MR. BOR: Thank you. Mr. Chairman, if you  
24 please, I just heard-- well, I heard from  
25 Tracey. She's on that same list.

1           But I just got a text from Mr. Gallagher,  
2 Comcast went down in his neighborhood. So he  
3 will be calling in. So if whoever is  
4 monitoring could monitor the call-ins, let's  
5 get him in and keep him on hold until Ms. Riley  
6 is finished.

7           MR. HILL: Vince.

8           MR. POLISTINA: Yes.

9           MR. HILL: Pat, will that draft that you  
10 are going to submit to the MUA, will that  
11 include some cost projections at least?

12          MR. COLE: Yes, it will. What we will  
13 give you is a sense of the scope of work that  
14 is necessary to get done, the schedule that is  
15 necessary to implement it and some of the  
16 potential failure mechanisms that we can  
17 predict and how to mitigate them.

18          And then, of course, a picture of the cost  
19 that are projected for expenditure this year,  
20 capital costs and what it takes to kind of get  
21 these systems implemented.

22          And then we will be working with Vince to  
23 flesh out probably a less accurate but longer  
24 term picture of what the ultimate cost might be  
25 for the permanent solution.

1           Again, I want to emphasize folks here you  
2           are familiar with utility operations. You know  
3           the less detail that can go into the greater  
4           analysis, the less firm the numbers are. So we  
5           can be pretty good about what the numbers will  
6           be for this year and we can put some reasonable  
7           factors of safety for what the ultimate--

8           MR. HILL: I would assume that we will do  
9           that, we will look at that, the engineering  
10          committee. And I believe Mr. Banfield might be  
11          on that committee with me as chairman. And Ms.  
12          Langford, I am not sure how that all worked  
13          out.

14          But anyway, point is, we should take a  
15          look at that first with Claude and Nick and Mr.  
16          Armstrong before the whole board gets it  
17          because it's going to be a little bit detailed,  
18          correct, Vince?

19          MR. POLISTINA: Positively, yes. We will  
20          go back to the engineering committee with that  
21          draft and then we will take a look at it and  
22          take a look at the schedule. So that's  
23          absolutely going to be the process.

24          MR. HILL: Thank you.

25          MR. POLISTINA: And you know, from my

1           standpoint and for all of your standpoint,  
2           thanks to H2M. I mean, one of the things we  
3           needed to do was respond quickly and  
4           aggressively to the situation, H2M has done  
5           that.

6           And so within a week or so we will see a  
7           draft memo that is next step for getting us to  
8           the point where we can comply with the DEPs  
9           regulations.

10           MR. HILL: Thank you.

11           MR. POLISTINA: That's it unless anybody  
12           has any questions. Thanks, Pat.

13           MR. COLE: Thank you, folks.

14           MR. SMITH: Thank you, Pat, for coming on.  
15           I appreciate it.

16           MR. COLE: Thank you.

17           MR. POLISTINA: Thank you for your time.

18           MR. SMITH: Thank you both.

19           MR. BOR: Any comments that Ms. Riley  
20           has--

21           MR. RILEY: Hey, Fred.

22           MR. BOR: Yes.

23           MR. RILEY: Yes, it's Mike Riley. I am  
24           back on. Tracey is not on. So if you are  
25           looking for her, I'm here.



1           MR. BOR: I'm looking for you or Tracey.  
2           I would rather have Tracey but go ahead.

3           MR. RILEY: That's what everybody says,  
4           Fred. But I have gotten used to that so.

5           MR. BOR: I guess we will update and then  
6           we will go back to number six. Go ahead, Mike.  
7           You are on.

8           MR. RILEY: Yes. The update is not  
9           unusual given the circumstances that we have  
10          discussed in the past. Discovery is ongoing in  
11          the PFAS case. They are resuming now more and  
12          more to remote Zoom type depositions.

13          I mentioned to Mike and Claude the other  
14          day that it gives us more access to some of  
15          these distant depositions in areas that have  
16          maybe uniqueness to our case and would be  
17          helpful.

18          So the process is ongoing. They begin to  
19          tier the levels of discovery based on the  
20          placement of the cases in the queue as moving  
21          forward. So we are still a ways away from  
22          getting any concrete information or any answers  
23          as to when we are going to be actually in  
24          court.

25          But the discovery is ongoing. And it's

1            hopefully will be, you know, done sooner rather  
2            than later. But in any event, if anybody has  
3            any questions I would be glad to answer them.

4            MR. BOR: Thank you, Mike. I appreciate  
5            that.

6            MR. RILEY: No problem.

7            MR. BOR: Mr. Chairman, I just received  
8            another text from Dan. And Comcast is having a  
9            problem. Is there any way we can call him,  
10           Kelley or someone to get him on the line?

11           THE CHAIRMAN: Yes. Do whatever you have  
12           to do, Fred.

13           MR. HILL: Mr. Bor.

14           MR. BOR: Yes.

15           MR. HILL: Okay. As I mentioned, thank  
16           you for those reports, Riley and Riley. And I  
17           wanted to bring this matter up. And it doesn't  
18           have to be a physical agenda item. But it's  
19           very important. I talked to our engineering  
20           consultant yesterday about this. And we did  
21           talk about this at engineering committee, Mr.  
22           Armstrong and Mr. Smith.

23           We really are in disparate need of a  
24           master plan which we know we do not have. And  
25           I know Michael, you and I were going to try to

1 get together, you know, whatever. Anyway, so I  
2 know Ms. Langford agreed that we should move  
3 forward with that as well on the committee.

4 Vince, can you tell maybe the rest of the  
5 board members why it is imperative or important  
6 with your guidance, of course, as an  
7 engineering consultant about the master plan  
8 and the action we should take.

9 MR. POLISTINA: Sure, Gary. Thanks. That  
10 was kind of a-- it came out of the annual  
11 report. So the authority is required to have a  
12 consulting engineer come and-- on an annual  
13 basis, the status of the system, you know,  
14 doing inspection of the system and then also  
15 comment on the budget.

16 And one of things that I-- you know, as I  
17 was reviewing this stuff, the last master plan  
18 was done 2005, 2006 timeframe when, you know,  
19 the economy was at the height of everything.  
20 And then of course everything kind of turned.

21 We haven't really looked at it now for  
22 around 15 years. And because of the situation  
23 with the economy, some of the things were  
24 identified we have not been able to get to.  
25 And so I think it's kind of twofold.

1           One, there really is a need now to get all  
2 of these projects on paper, we know what we  
3 need to do, and kind of come up with some  
4 planning over a period of time to address them.

5           And then secondly, is with all of the  
6 infrastructure talk is going on in Washington.  
7 One of things that needs to be in place in  
8 order to try to seek money if money becomes  
9 available is to kind of identify these projects  
10 and get these projects to a point where you  
11 know you can get them going.

12           So I think it is kind of twofold. One,  
13 there are things we need to do. Two, if money  
14 becomes available, we want to make sure that we  
15 are in a position that we can, you know, make  
16 available any money that we can get to help out  
17 the authority.

18           And so it is really twofold. That date is  
19 very important to get it going now so that we  
20 have it done as quickly as possible.

21           MR. HILL: I guess I am asking either Mr.  
22 Bor or the chairman or Mr. Armstrong, I am not  
23 sure who, do we need to set up-- how do we move  
24 forward with this? Can we-- knowing we need to  
25 do this, we want to do this, what's the-- what

1 would your recommendation be, Mr. Armstrong?

2 MR. ARMSTRONG: Why don't we schedule a  
3 separate meeting with at least two board  
4 members to get it moving. And then, you know,  
5 when you set dates in a timeline then things  
6 get done that way. I am open to setting up a  
7 date--

8 MR. HILL: Okay.

9 MR. ARMSTRONG: -- to have a meeting.

10 MR. HILL: That's fine. That sounds like  
11 good advice. So we will ask Mr. Polistina  
12 obviously to be part of that.

13 MR. ARMSTRONG: Yes.

14 MR. POLISTINA: Absolutely, thanks.

15 MR. HILL: Thank you.

16 MR. POLISTINA: You're welcome.

17 MR. BOR: Are you with us now, Mr.  
18 Gallagher?

19 MS. WILLIAMS: We are trying to get him  
20 on, Fred.

21 MR. BOR: I have his number. Do you have  
22 it?

23 MS. WILLIAMS: I have his number, but his  
24 phone is not ringing.

25 MR. BOR: Do you have the 609-541-4956?

1 MS. WILLIAMS: Yes.

2 MR. ARMSTRONG: Can I make a suggestion  
3 since you have him online? Fred, if there is a  
4 number that he could call in on via Zoom like  
5 everyone else, if somebody just-- if you could  
6 text him that number--

7 MR. BOR: His Comcast is down, Mike.

8 MR. ARMSTRONG: I am talking about his  
9 telephone number not his-- he can call in via  
10 cell.

11 MR. BOR: But he can't get the Zoom link  
12 where the phone is located in his Comcast--

13 MR. ARMSTRONG: No, I am saying to you if  
14 we give you a number to text to him if you--

15 MS. JOHNSON: Excuse me. We do have Mr.  
16 Gallagher on the line. I am about to transfer  
17 him.

18 MR. BOR: Thank you, Mr. Armstrong. If I  
19 may, board, just before Mr. Gallagher gets on--  
20 are you there, Dan? Are you there, Dan?

21 MS. WILLIAMS: Hold on.

22 MR. BOR: Before Dan picks up, may I have  
23 the floor just briefly? Especially with our  
24 two new members. This pursuit of a property  
25 tax exemption from several of our

1 municipalities where our pipes flow through en  
2 route to our plant, we are trying to get  
3 property tax exemptions.

4 This whole concept was-- actually the  
5 genesis of it was Mr. Robert Long and me--

6 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay. Mr. Gallagher--

7 MR. BOR: So at some point awhile back  
8 Mr. Dan Gallagher who is an expert in tax  
9 skills was appointed by the board at the rate  
10 of \$150 an hour not to exceed 15,000. And both  
11 he and I have been kind of cocounsel. And then  
12 when Mr. Long was with us he was in the mix.

13 This litigation is incredibly important to  
14 the financial viability of the authority since  
15 we pay almost 100,000 a year for property tax  
16 exemptions that Mr. Gallagher and I believe we  
17 shouldn't. But I will leave that legal  
18 argument up to Mr. Gallagher. Are you there,  
19 Dan?

20 MS. WILLIAMS: Yes, he is.

21 MR. GALLAGHER: I'm here. And I would  
22 like to apologize first. But unfortunately,  
23 Comcast did something to the internet that  
24 wiped it out for the whole block. So I was on  
25 a conference with the superior court judge

1 earlier this morning and it got cut off so.

2 MR. BOR: I gave the background. And if  
3 you could get us up to date on--

4 MR. GALLAGHER: So I apologize about that.  
5 Do you want me to discuss where we are at with  
6 the case, Fred?

7 MR. BOR: Yes. I gave them a background  
8 on why we are doing this and how important it  
9 is to the authority. And you are lead counsel  
10 on it so--

11 MR. GALLAGHER: Well, the whole background  
12 on this is we-- the ACMUA is being taxed by Egg  
13 Harbor Township, Galloway, Absecon and  
14 Pleasantville. They don't tax the  
15 improvements. They tax the real property.

16 They are hanging their hat basically on a  
17 1969 appellate court decision that is not  
18 well-written, but it's not in our favor.

19 The way I interpret the statute, the way  
20 every other MUA and the state interprets the  
21 statute is diametrically opposed this to the  
22 way the taxing districts are looking at this.  
23 We are before Judge (inaudible). We just had a  
24 hearing the other day. And I told Fred this is  
25 a matter of statutory interpretation.



1           I don't know where the judge is going to  
2 go on this because he is a superior court  
3 judge. I don't know if he is going to put it  
4 on the line and go out and overturn our  
5 (inaudible) appellate court decision which he  
6 really is not supposed to do.

7           I would like to sit down with Fred and Mr.  
8 Armstrong and contemplate where we go with this  
9 case, maybe get some help with the state from  
10 our perspective on this case because it is very  
11 important.

12           And this-- the municipalities where our  
13 properties are located are interpreting the law  
14 different than any other municipalities that I  
15 have know from the state. And Fred, you can  
16 back me up on that.

17           And I don't know where this judge is going  
18 to go. I don't know if he is going to stick  
19 his neck out on the line and try and overturn  
20 or go against an appellate court decision. And  
21 I don't know where he is going to go.

22           And the bottom line is any indication the  
23 other day adhere it, but my recommendation is  
24 if he is not going to go out and make a  
25 determination contrary to the appellate court

1 decision, again, it's a 1969 decision, that the  
2 MUA go forward to the appellate division which  
3 is something I discussed with Fred, could be  
4 the ultimate outcome of where we go with this  
5 because it's a decision that needs to be  
6 addressed.

7 The financial stakes for the MUA going  
8 forward could be substantial. There could be  
9 substantial savings here that the MUA has been  
10 paying that may not become an expense in the  
11 future. So you know, it's worth taking the  
12 time to go forward on this, go forward on it  
13 the right way.

14 I believe our interpretation of the  
15 statute is correct. But I really would like to  
16 sit down with Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Bor and  
17 whoever from the board wants to hear where we  
18 are going and actually can see the statutes and  
19 where we are going.

20 MR. BOR: Dan--

21 MR. GALLAGHER: On the decisions--

22 MR. BOR: Dan--

23 MR. GALLAGHER: -- since that 1969  
24 decision seem to indicate that if the MUA owns  
25 ownership property, that isn't exempt from

1           taxation.  However, all the other properties  
2           are.  It's the case, the Morris County case,  
3           but it is directly on point for how we are  
4           interpreting the statute.  We just got that  
5           1969 case that kind of goes against us.  And  
6           that's an appellate court decision.

7           The Morris County case interprets the  
8           statute the same way we are requesting that be  
9           interpreted and I would agree that ownership  
10          properties which is property that you know to  
11          protect the MUA property, those properties are  
12          not exempt from taxation.

13          However, every single parcel under this  
14          tax appeal-- and there is millions of dollars  
15          in parcels-- they are continuous, they lead  
16          right into Atlantic City.  And every one of  
17          those are used in the day-to-day operations.

18          And Nick Mancuso did a great job sitting  
19          in my office and going over the particularities  
20          of each property at length with the facts on  
21          our side.  It's just a statutory  
22          interpretation.

23          And again, before the judge makes a  
24          decision which who knows when that will be,  
25          let's take the time to sit down and discuss

1           these matters with Fred and Mr. Armstrong so we  
2           can kind of plot out which way to go depending  
3           on how the judge decides.

4           MR. BOR:   Now, Dan, this is Fred.   Can you  
5           hear me?

6           MR. GALLAGHER:   Yes, I can hear you.

7           MR. BOR:   And of course the board should  
8           know that subsequent decision involving Morris  
9           Utilities is subsequent and that's a favorable  
10          decision that we are going to be relying on  
11          hopefully but--

12          MR. GALLAGHER:   We rely upon that heavily  
13          during our argument.   So it is really-- it's in  
14          the Judge's lap right now.   I don't know that  
15          this particular judge where he is going to go  
16          or if he is going to buck a superior court  
17          appellate division, their decision or he is  
18          just going to punt it and let us go to the  
19          appellate division.   I couldn't tell where it  
20          was going from our hearing the other day, but  
21          we can wait and find out.   But I think--

22          MR. BOR:   Well, Dan--

23          MR. GALLAGHER:   -- it's always prudent to  
24          sit down and say all right we are going to go  
25          in this direction if it is in our favor or this

1 direction if it's against us.

2 MR. BOR: Well, Dan, if the ruling is  
3 against us-- and we are totally optimistic it  
4 won't be eventually-- it could effect most of  
5 the MUAs in this state, presently claim  
6 exceptions from the municipality.

7 MR. GALLAGHER: We'll put it this way,  
8 Fred. If the judge leaves the-- if he goes and  
9 doesn't bump that 1969 decision and leaves  
10 everything status quo, in essence he is saying  
11 that every district in the state of New Jersey  
12 is taxing the MUAs the wrong way and the only  
13 people who are doing right are Galloway,  
14 Pleasantville, Absecon and Egg Harbor Township,  
15 as you know that's what the (inaudible) mean.  
16 That can't be.

17 MR. BOR: Okay. Well, going forward, Dan  
18 and the members of the board--

19 MR. GALLAGHER: So that's my report.  
20 That's where we are at. And again, I will be  
21 looking for dates when I can meet you Fred and  
22 when Mr. Armstrong is available.

23 MR. BOR: We will set that up with Mr.  
24 Armstrong and myself and I appreciate your  
25 report. And on the agenda, Mr. Gallagher, is

1 an extension of your present contract. And the  
2 board will be addressing that shortly and  
3 advise you of same.

4 But great job so far. We have our fingers  
5 crossed. Any questions of Mr. Gallagher? All  
6 right, Dan. Take care.

7 MR. GALLAGHER: Again, I apologize for the  
8 technical issues. Sometimes Comcast just  
9 doesn't let you know what they are doing.

10 MR. BOR: Yes, I hear you.

11 MR. GALLAGHER: All right. Have a good  
12 day.

13 MR. BOR: Thank you. Mr. Chairman.

14 MR. ARMSTRONG: Actually, Fred, we have  
15 one more agenda, engineering agenda item.

16 MR. BOR: Oh, I'm sorry.

17 MR. ARMSTRONG: It's not listed. It was  
18 on the last agenda, but we did discuss it in  
19 the engineering committee with respect to Lake  
20 Field. I'm sure that Mr. Hill remembers the  
21 savings that we talked about.

22 There was a contract with Lake Field which  
23 was the company that was supposed to put the  
24 tarp over the basin. There was a basin that  
25 was newly constructed. Claude, do you want to

1 chime in on that and then I will talk about  
2 what we did.

3 MR. SMITH: Actually, Lake Field was  
4 actually hired several years ago to do some  
5 patchwork on the existent cover that we had at  
6 basin (inaudible). They did proceed with doing  
7 some of the particular patchwork that called  
8 for. And they did a majority of that  
9 particular patchwork.

10 But despite the fact that they did do the  
11 patchwork that they were hired to do, we still  
12 had a failure in that particular cover. That  
13 does not dismiss the fact that they were hired  
14 to do a certain amount of work which they did  
15 complete.

16 And we paid them a portion of that  
17 particular work that was actually done. It's  
18 just that the moneys was actually left over  
19 from that particular contract that was not paid  
20 out in a timely fashion.

21 Of course they had actually contacted us.  
22 And prior to that I had tried to do some  
23 negotiations with them in trying to decrease  
24 some of the cost that was incurred. We did not  
25 come to an agreement.

1           And at the same time, just about the time  
2           that Mr. Armstrong came to the authority, we  
3           were contacted again and we did some initial--  
4           some additional negotiation in regards to that  
5           particular contact. And I will let you take  
6           over from that, Mike.

7           MR. ARMSTRONG: Yes. I did contact the  
8           construction manager with respect to the  
9           negotiating reduction based on the information  
10          that was provided to me by Claude. The  
11          contract total was 100,000. I think we  
12          withheld somewhere in the neighborhood of a  
13          little over 50,000.

14          Based on my discussions with the  
15          construction manager, he agreed to accept our  
16          offer of ten percent off the total contract  
17          price which would be a savings of approximately  
18          \$10,000 to the authority.

19          Based on that, I prepared two letters plus  
20          a proposed release to-- submitted it to the  
21          solicitor. And Fred reviewed it. And I  
22          believe I reviewed an email back indicating  
23          everything was satisfactory.

24          And so I-- with the board's approval to  
25          accept the offer to reduce the contract amount



1 by \$10,000, we will move forward and pay him  
2 the difference of approximately 40-- I believe  
3 it was 47,000.

4 THE BOARD MEMBER: 41.

5 MR. ARMSTRONG: \$41,000.

6 THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Armstrong, just for  
7 housekeeping stuff, as far as stuff like that  
8 that comes on the agenda late, I understand  
9 it's an emergency. I am not even talking about  
10 this. But normally, what we like to-- what I  
11 like to do as chairman is, like, have that in  
12 my hand.

13 I would like-- I mean that, to me, is a  
14 lot of money. I would like to have read that  
15 or I would like to be at least prior to now-- I  
16 am going to support this today because this  
17 seems like it's exigent.

18 In the future I would like-- if something  
19 like that is going to come late on the board, I  
20 would rather hold it just until I have enough  
21 time to review it. I mean, it seems like a lot  
22 of money for our budget.

23 How do you propose to work that in the  
24 future if we get something last minute? I  
25 don't want to take over that part. But how do

1           you propose to be fair to the whole board?

2           You are putting something in front of us  
3           to vote on today which is fine. How do we  
4           propose to do that in the future as far as last  
5           minute items being put on the agenda or not put  
6           on the agenda and for us to vote on that?

7           MR. ARMSTRONG: Well, this was actually on  
8           the last agenda and it was submitted. It just  
9           when the agenda got revised it was taken off.  
10          And we didn't notice that it was taken off. So  
11          it was actually put on for the original  
12          meeting.

13          So it's kind of-- we just realized it when  
14          the agenda got revised that it wasn't on there.  
15          And it is not effecting the budget in a  
16          negative way. It is actually effecting the  
17          budget in a positive way.

18          And we thought it would be necessary to  
19          capitalize on obtaining this \$10,000 because  
20          there is some potential legal liability that  
21          you can be exposed to if this thing gets  
22          extended.

23          So to answer your question just  
24          procedurally, I totally agree. I mean, if  
25          anything comes last minute to the extent that

1 we are able to provide that information to the  
2 board in advanced, that's the goal.

3 I mean, I clearly understand the fact that  
4 you are going to have to vote on it. You are  
5 going to have to have whatever information that  
6 you need to make an informed decision. I don't  
7 make decisions unless I have all the  
8 documentation in front of me. So I wouldn't  
9 expect that you would have to make the same or  
10 similar decision.

11 So to the extent or-- and if it comes  
12 before you at the last minute, I will give you  
13 an idea of whether or not it can be held or how  
14 urgent it is or something like that. I am very  
15 familiar with that process. And that's the way  
16 I would handle it.

17 THE CHAIRMAN: That's fair enough. I  
18 mean, I just have and I know some other board  
19 members have pet peeves about-- and I am not  
20 discussing this. I am just talking about our  
21 future. Because I am sure there is going to be  
22 last minute things, fair enough, that are going  
23 to be put in front of us.

24 I just want to, you know, kind of kill two  
25 birds with one stone kind of thing. Let's have

1           that discussion. And you know, obviously there  
2           is going to be exigent issues and, you know, we  
3           will deal with them as they come.

4           But I just want to have some kind of  
5           procedure moving forward where, you know, if  
6           something was overlooked or something-- because  
7           I have nothing outside of your advice and  
8           opinion that we should support this even though  
9           it was on last month's agenda. I can't even  
10          tell you what I had last night for dinner.

11          So moving forward let's, you know, come up  
12          with a little bit of a procedure or-- again,  
13          I'm available 24 hours a day. You are more  
14          than welcome to call me, Mr. Armstrong. I gave  
15          you my cellphone, my personal cellphone and my  
16          personal email.

17          Anything like that, I would ask you to  
18          please reach out to me. And I will do my due  
19          diligence and reach out to the rest of the  
20          board. I think that moving forward that will  
21          be great working together on that in that kind  
22          of issue. Thank you.

23          MR. BOR: Mr. Chairman, this is Counsel  
24          Bor again. So I did review the release of  
25          this. And I agree the information should be

1 available to the board. Although, I agree with  
2 the ED that the settlement appeared fair. And  
3 the release that I reviewed was accurate.

4 As far as Robert's Rules is concerned,  
5 there is many motions that can be made right on  
6 the same day of the meeting, but they are of a  
7 different nature.

8 So I agree if you are comfortable with it  
9 members of the board, move it ahead and agree  
10 on this settlement with Lake Field.

11 THE CHAIRMAN: No, I totally agree. I  
12 actually tip my hat. I think it's a nice job.  
13 And like Mr. Armstrong said, it behooves us to  
14 move forward with it. I was just making  
15 comments about procedural issues down the line.

16 MR. BOR: Well, it's not on the agenda.  
17 But if we want to make a motion-- Mr.  
18 Armstrong, would you like a motion to be heard  
19 by the board?

20 MR. ARMSTRONG: Yes.

21 THE CHAIRMAN: Motion.

22 MR. BOR: And it's a motion to approve the  
23 release and the settlement with Lake Field as  
24 set forth by the executive director. Is there  
25 a motion?

1 MR. HILL: Mr. Devlin made the motion.  
2 And I will second the motion. And we did  
3 discuss this at length at the engineering  
4 meeting. I want that in the record as well.

5 MR. BOR: Yes, we did.

6 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Gary.

7 MR. BOR: Ms. Bailey. Ms. Bailey.

8 MS. BAILEY: Yes. Yes.

9 MR. BOR: Mr. Banfield. Mr. Banfield.

10 MR. ARMSTRONG: I can't hear you.

11 MR. BOR: You are muted.

12 MR. ARMSTRONG: I can't hear you. We  
13 still can't hear you. Your mike is off. There  
14 you go. It's on now.

15 MR. BANFIELD: One quick question. You  
16 are saying this is something that has to be  
17 done expeditiously right now or--

18 MR. BOR: Yes.

19 MR. BANFIELD: Okay. So otherwise they  
20 could be liable for more money?

21 MR. ARMSTRONG: Here is what the-- is the  
22 problem with it is under the-- this is a  
23 construction contract. And under construction  
24 contracts you have what is called the Prompt  
25 Payment Act which was instituted about ten

1           years ago.

2                   So if you are not going to pay a  
3           particular invoice within a certain amount of  
4           time related to some sort of construction  
5           project, usually I think it's 30 days. It may  
6           have changed. But then you have to raise  
7           issues as to what you are disputing.

8                   This particular company is out of  
9           California. They may not be aware of that. So  
10          you know, Claude and I went through this. I  
11          think it has been in dispute for over a year.  
12          It is not clear of whether or not they can make  
13          a claim under the, you know-- you know, in  
14          fact, now that I think about it, now that we  
15          are getting into the details, this actually  
16          should be in executive session.

17                   It really should be because we are talking  
18          about a settlement. We are talking about  
19          details related to the settlement. Some things  
20          that I am about to go into I wouldn't want to  
21          say out in open session.

22                   So if you want to hold this and we go in  
23          closed session, I will be glad to answer your  
24          question.

25                   THE CHAIRMAN: Fred, there is a motion and

1 seconded. How do we go about that?

2 MR. HILL: Do we pull it?

3 MR. ARMSTRONG: You didn't get to--

4 MR. BOR: We can renew it after closed  
5 session.

6 THE CHAIRMAN: Okay.

7 MR. BOR: But we can--

8 THE CHAIRMAN: Fred-- Fred-- everybody be  
9 quite for a second. I want to make sure we are  
10 doing this legally. There is a motion on the  
11 floor and it was seconded. Do we have to pull  
12 that or--

13 MR. BOR: Well, the executive director  
14 believes that it is a matter that should be in  
15 closed session. And I would defer to that and  
16 just pull the motion and just renew it right  
17 after closed session.

18 THE CHAIRMAN: Okay. The motion is  
19 pulled. I pull my motion.

20 MR. BOR: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. We did  
21 not address 6 B, Mr. Chairman. And that is  
22 whether the board wants to extend Mr.  
23 Gallagher's relationship.

24 Mr. Gallagher is working on his last deal  
25 at \$150 an hour which is very, very fair given



1 his experience, not to exceed 15,000.

2 And based upon his presentation and what's  
3 going on, and he is conscientious about  
4 submitting bills properly, I am asking the  
5 board to consider whether they want to have a  
6 motion to extend his contract, same deal at  
7 \$150 an hour not to exceed 15,000.

8 MR. HILL: I would like to-- I agree to  
9 that because he has-- Dan Gallagher, this is  
10 his lane, tax issues, tax appeals, tax things.  
11 And he has done a very good job so far. We are  
12 hoping for a good resort of course and result.  
13 So I would make a motion to continue his  
14 contract.

15 MR. ARMSTRONG: If I may, I have been  
16 informed by the state that any professional  
17 contracts are going to be on hold as well.

18 MR. HILL: It's on--

19 MR. ARMSTRONG: They-- actually Phil  
20 Gonzales is on now.

21 MR. HILL: Okay.

22 MR. ARMSTRONG: And through a conversation  
23 we were clarifying which things we can move  
24 forward right after he received the--

25 MR. HILL: So then I will just withdraw

1           that.

2           MR. ARMSTRONG:   Okay.

3           MR. BOR:    So--

4           THE CHAIRMAN:   Fred, hold on one second.

5           MR. BOR:    We can't go forward with the  
6           contract extension?

7           MR. ARMSTRONG:   No.

8           MR. BOR:    Okay.  Is there a timeframe or  
9           something available?  Because, you know, you  
10          can't expect people to work unless they know  
11          they are going to be paid.

12          MR. ARMSTRONG:   Well, Mr. Gonzalez is  
13          here.  I am assuming that it will just roll  
14          over and they just won't have a contract.  But  
15          the terms and conditions-- but I will let Mr.  
16          Gonzales to speak for the state.

17          MR. BOR:    So in other words, what you are  
18          saying is just continue as is with his prior  
19          contract rather than a new one.

20          MR. ARMSTRONG:   I am assuming that's what  
21          they are--- I don't want to speak directly for  
22          the state.

23          MR. GONZALEZ:   Is someone else speaking?  
24          Can I speak?

25          MR. ARMSTRONG:   Yes.

1           MR. GONZALEZ:   Okay.   Good morning,  
2           everyone.   My name is Phil Gonzalez from the  
3           DCA.   And right now I have just been assigned  
4           here to Atlantic City last week or I have been  
5           here about all this week.

6           And just-- we are trying to put our ducks  
7           in a row in terms of looking at the Atlantic  
8           City MUA.   And I just want to-- I asked  
9           Mr. Armstrong to just put a freeze on  
10          everything other than any emergency purchases  
11          or emergency orders.

12          I said to him from the very beginning I am  
13          not looking to turn off the water.   I still  
14          want to keep the water flowing.   But I just  
15          need to take some time to step back and take a  
16          look at the finances and how and what direction  
17          the MUA has been going in and get a feel for  
18          what direction it looks to go in in the future.

19          My analysis is you should be done within  
20          the next month or so.   And one of things that I  
21          did was I put a freeze on any hiree promotions  
22          other than any hiree that there was already a  
23          motion up until last week.   So if someone had  
24          been given a starting date for this week or  
25          next week, I would still honor that as to the--

1 allow the MUA to honor that.

2 But my analysis, I expect it should take  
3 about a month or so. I don't think it will go  
4 any longer than that. And I have worked with  
5 Mr. Armstrong and his staff over the past week.

6 Yesterday we had an extensive meeting over  
7 some issues, some questions that they had and  
8 some concerns. And we moved forward on  
9 probably about I think all of them just about.

10 They made some very good cases as to why  
11 they needed to do some things. And I conceded  
12 and agreed to them. (Inaudible.)

13 MR. BOR: Mr. Gonzalez.

14 MR. GONZALEZ: Yes, sir.

15 MR. BOR: How are you, sir? I am Fred  
16 Bor, general counsel to the authority. Nice to  
17 meet you.

18 MR. GONZALEZ: Nice to meet you. Same  
19 here.

20 MR. BOR: If an individual such as  
21 Mr. Gallagher who is not a new hire, are we  
22 permitted just to have him keep going at the  
23 prior past contract just to continue working?  
24 He is not a new hire.

25 MR. GONZALEZ: Yes. I clarified that with

1 Mr. Armstrong, yes.

2 MR. BOR: So he can continue working at  
3 his older-- well, the older rates are the same  
4 as the newer one, okay. Because he is not  
5 really a new hire. I got it.

6 MR. GONZALEZ: Right.

7 MR. BOR: Okay.

8 MR. GONZALEZ: Yes.

9 MR. BOR: Thank you, sir.

10 MR. GONZALEZ: Very good. Thank you.

11 THE CHAIRMAN: Fred.

12 MR. BOR: Yes. Yes, Mr. Devlin?

13 THE CHAIRMAN: What do we have next?

14 MR. BOR: Okay. And I will inform Mr.  
15 Gallagher of that, that there will be no new  
16 contract. But the state is acquiescing to  
17 his-- continuing at his old rate while he is  
18 diligently working on the appeal.

19 Next public-- excuse me. Operations, DEP  
20 underground storage tank inspection. Is that  
21 you, Claude? Is that you, Nick?

22 MR. MANCUSO: Yes. I will discuss, guys.  
23 Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Bor, would you guys like to  
24 discuss this in closed session or open?

25 MR. BOR: Well, is there a matter that

1 involves a legal issue, a litigation issue in  
2 the matter that it should be in closed?

3 MR. MANCUSO: Yes.

4 MR. BOR: Okay. Then we will hold that.  
5 Financial reports. Anita, you there?

6 MS. THAPA: If any board member has any  
7 questions, I am glad to answer the questions on  
8 the financials.

9 MR. BOR: Okay. Thank you, Anita. How  
10 about cash management or balance adjustments?

11 MS. THAPA: Same as well.

12 MR. BOR: Same thing. And are there  
13 shutoffs in effect or are we holding off on  
14 those still?

15 MS. THAPA: Due to the governor's order  
16 extended to June 30th, we are holding off  
17 shutoff as well as the penalty as well.

18 MR. BOR: Fair enough. Number eight, do  
19 we have--

20 MS. WILLIAMS: Wait. I'm sorry. We have  
21 to call Mr. Turner on the phone because he is  
22 having a problem getting in the Zoom. So we  
23 have to call him.

24 MR. BOR: Then we will take number nine  
25 and go back to him if you don't mind.

1 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay.

2 MR. BOR: Number nine, designation of a  
3 compliance officer. Mr. Armstrong, will you  
4 tell us the nature of this position and--

5 MR. ARMSTRONG: Yes. The compliance  
6 officer is a position that you have had in the  
7 past. We are going to ask that this be held  
8 though.

9 Claude and I discussed it this morning.  
10 And the compliance officers responsibilities  
11 and duties are typically-- a good deal of them  
12 are being handled by Claude already.

13 And there is-- we are considering and also  
14 requesting that there be a qualified purchasing  
15 agent as a part of the organizational structure  
16 in the future. And we believe that some of the  
17 responsibilities would also be commingled with  
18 that person's job responsibilities.

19 But given the nature, Claude and I went  
20 over in detail the statutory responsibilities  
21 of this position as compliance officer this  
22 morning. And it appears that he is doing a  
23 significant number of those things already as a  
24 part of construction contracts.

25 The compliance officer's responsibility

1 would be to make sure that you meet all your  
2 requirements under the equal employment  
3 opportunity at with respect to, you know,  
4 minority participation, number of women who  
5 will participate in contracts that are given  
6 out to contractors.

7 Since Claude is, you know, part of putting  
8 those contracts together and making sure that  
9 those forms and documents are filled out, we  
10 just need a little bit more time to determine  
11 whether or not it's something that should fall  
12 under his responsibility or we should make it  
13 part of a presentation that we plan to present  
14 to you with regard to a purchasing agent or  
15 qualified purchasing agent.

16 I did speak to Mr. Gonzalez about the need  
17 for a qualifying purchasing agent as well. I  
18 won't go into it in detail right now until we  
19 are ready to, you know, give the board a  
20 presentation in that regard.

21 But it appears based on my discussion with  
22 him as a representative of the state, that  
23 would be something that they would be willing  
24 to approve and would encourage.

25 MR. BOR: Thank you, sir. Okay. So we



1 are going to pull 9 A until the next meeting or  
2 until we have an additional report from our ED.

3 New business abatement. As we know, not  
4 necessary to appear, there appears to be two on  
5 deck. One-- number one and number two. Mr.  
6 Armstrong, are these bills eligible for their  
7 abatements?

8 MR. ARMSTRONG: My understanding that I  
9 wasn't here-- this is I think--

10 MR. MANCUSO: Mr. Armstrong, I can take it  
11 if you prefer.

12 MR. ARMSTRONG: Yes, I actually have you  
13 listed with respect to those as-- we just  
14 weren't sure if you were going to be here  
15 today.

16 MR. MANCUSO: No problem. I'm here. With  
17 that said, these are relatively small  
18 abatements. Both are residential customers. I  
19 believe financially one is a \$500 return and  
20 the other one is a \$200 return approximately.

21 The \$200 return also just made the  
22 threshold. So one I believe was a toilet leak  
23 and the other one had a broken house pipe, but  
24 these are pretty standard.

25 MR. BOR: And I take it from your

1 information they have not had an abatement  
2 previously?

3 MR. MANCUSO: That is correct, never.

4 MR. BOR: Okay. If that's the case, if  
5 the board is inclined, is there a motion on 10  
6 A, abatements for the two individuals, one and  
7 two.

8 THE CHAIRMAN: Motion.

9 MR. HILL: Second.

10 MR. BOR: Ms. Bailey.

11 MS. BAILEY: Yes.

12 MR. BOR: Mr. Banfield.

13 MR. BANFIELD: Yes.

14 MR. BOR: Thank you. Mr. Hill.

15 MR. HILL: Yes.

16 MR. BOR: Ms. Langford.

17 MS. LANGFORD: Yes.

18 MR. BOR: And Mr. Devlin.

19 THE CHAIRMAN: Yes. Thanks, Fred.

20 MR. BOR: Now I guess on B considering  
21 what-- the information we just got from Mr.  
22 Gonzalez, we are also going to pull that, Mr.  
23 Armstrong. And let him continue in his present  
24 situation until that issue is clarified with  
25 the state.

1 MR. ARMSTRONG: That's correct. We still  
2 have to look at the statute because you have to  
3 respond to these requests in a certain amount  
4 of time before they expire. You have to put  
5 them out again. So maybe we can get an answer  
6 before that timeframe and that way we don't  
7 have to put it out again.

8 THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Armstrong, can I chime  
9 in real quick?

10 MR. ARMSTRONG: Okay.

11 THE CHAIRMAN: So in the past and when I  
12 first came on the board, they would present  
13 RFQs and RFPs for any vendor to certain boards.  
14 I know for legal-- and me and Ms. Bailey have a  
15 long history of working together on this-- that  
16 is presented to the personnel committee or it  
17 is presented to certain board members to review  
18 an actual grade the RFP, RFQ. How are we  
19 moving forward?

20 I see it was on the agenda to be voted on  
21 today without-- you know, like you said  
22 earlier, there is a couple new board members  
23 that aren't familiar with the process and  
24 aren't familiar with the vendors. Is that  
25 going to go back to personnel committee? That

1 is usually how we did it in the past. Fred,  
2 isn't that correct?

3 MR. BOR: Yes. In the past there has been  
4 a pretty set procedure. It had once a deadline  
5 for RFQs came in, it then went to personnel  
6 committee to review, make recommendations and  
7 then have the vote be at the next regularly  
8 scheduled meeting with the input from the  
9 personnel committee.

10 MR. ARMSTRONG: Let me just say with  
11 respect to the last board meeting that I was  
12 at, it was asked to put this out at the board  
13 meeting. Now, it was not-- I don't set the  
14 agenda before I ever see the personnel  
15 committee. So the personnel committee meeting  
16 followed a couple weeks later.

17 So when we are at the last board meeting  
18 these-- the RFQ for Riley and Riley was  
19 discussed and I was directed to put it out.  
20 Now--

21 THE CHAIRMAN: Yes, Mike. I actually told  
22 you to do that. And I think it was a good  
23 idea. I didn't tell anybody, but I did say it  
24 was a good idea that's-- do RFP and RFQ. And I  
25 do that with all my committees. Normally--

1           MR. ARMSTRONG: This was done in a  
2 meeting.

3           THE CHAIRMAN: I understand.

4           MR. ARMSTRONG: This was done at a  
5 meeting.

6           THE CHAIRMAN: I agree with you.  
7 Absolutely 100 percent correct. I said it in a  
8 meeting. I said it live. I said that we  
9 should bring-- put this out for RFQ just like  
10 we do Mr. Weber's, just like we do Fred Bor's.

11           And you in return said said okay, we  
12 should do that also for the tax work, special  
13 counsel tax work which is-- I agreed with you  
14 with that if you recall.

15           MR. ARMSTRONG: I actually didn't have  
16 that conversation with you. That didn't happen  
17 that way.

18           THE CHAIRMAN: Okay. All right. I made  
19 it up.

20           MR. ARMSTRONG: I am not saying you made  
21 it up. The recollection is not that way. It's  
22 not personal like that. And I don't want to  
23 get into this back and forth. Let's please  
24 stay away from that. Can we stay away from  
25 that?

1 THE CHAIRMAN: I-- all right. I got the  
2 floor. Mike--

3 MR. ARMSTRONG: This is not necessary to  
4 move through in a meeting. And as a chairman I  
5 think it's inappropriate. So what I am saying  
6 to you is that my recollection is-- and I am  
7 not-- it's not a tit for tat type of thing,  
8 okay. But--

9 THE CHAIRMAN: Well, you are cut-- you  
10 know what Mike, if you let me--

11 MR. ARMSTRONG: Let me finish. All I said  
12 was--

13 THE CHAIRMAN: Mike, I have the floor.

14 MR. ARMSTRONG: I was responding and you  
15 cut me off.

16 THE CHAIRMAN: No, you cut me off. I am  
17 speaking, okay. So we had this meeting last  
18 month. And we did have the meeting. You  
19 corrected me. It was a regular meeting.

20 I said, "Yes it was a regular meeting." I  
21 still have the floor. And then you jumped in  
22 to tell me you didn't have this conversation,  
23 okay. My recollection was this--

24 MR. ARMSTRONG: I wasn't finished telling  
25 you what my recollection was. You didn't give

1 me a chance. You might agree with me if you  
2 let me--

3 THE CHAIRMAN: I said my recollection-- my  
4 recollection--

5 MR. ARMSTRONG: I know but what I am  
6 saying is I wanted the opportunity-- you might  
7 agree with me once you hear my recollection,  
8 but you never let me finish.

9 THE CHAIRMAN: Well, I was in the middle  
10 of--

11 MR. ARMSTRONG: It's just called respect.  
12 It's not called being--

13 THE CHAIRMAN: I know all about respect.

14 MR. ARMSTRONG: But I am telling you if  
15 you know--

16 THE CHAIRMAN: We are not in a courtroom  
17 here and you are not--

18 MR. ARMSTRONG: It's not about being  
19 chairman and running the meeting. It's about  
20 respect.

21 THE CHAIRMAN: Wait a minute. Wait a  
22 minute

23 MR. ARMSTRONG: When somebody is  
24 speaking--

25 THE CHAIRMAN: Mike--

1 MR. ARMSTRONG: These other board members  
2 deserve the opportunity to hear me speak.

3 THE CHAIRMAN: Mike, absolutely--

4 MR. ARMSTRONG: When you ask a question--

5 THE CHAIRMAN: Right after I get done--

6 MR. ARMSTRONG: They cannot make an  
7 informed decision if they don't hear me  
8 respond. You are not the only board member.

9 THE CHAIRMAN: You think you are in court,  
10 Mike. Go ahead. I will let you have--

11 MR. ARMSTRONG: No, I don't think I am in  
12 court.

13 THE CHAIRMAN: Go ahead.

14 MR. ARMSTRONG: I don't think I am in  
15 court.

16 THE CHAIRMAN: Go ahead, counselor.

17 MR. ARMSTRONG: I am talking about  
18 respect. You don't have to be in court to give  
19 respect.

20 THE CHAIRMAN: Okay. Go got it, Mike.  
21 You got the floor, Mike. Don't hold up my  
22 meeting any longer.

23 MR. ARMSTRONG: Thank you.

24 THE CHAIRMAN: Go ahead.

25 MR. ARMSTRONG: Thank you. What happened



1 was when we were in the meeting initially, you  
2 indicated to me that you wanted this RFQ to go  
3 out. I put the RFQ out. Then when it was out  
4 I didn't have a discussion with you about  
5 Gallagher. I actually had the discussion with  
6 Claude.

7 Claude and I-- Claude mentioned to me that  
8 there was another RFQ or another one that was  
9 about to expire and we-- it was mentioned that  
10 if we didn't get this one out that it would  
11 also be a problem. No one talked about this at  
12 the last meeting. They just said that he was  
13 going to come in at the subsequent meeting.  
14 That was it.

15 So when I said to Claude-- I said, "We  
16 will have Kelley send this RFQ out to Mr.  
17 Gallagher so that Mr. Gallagher, if he wants to  
18 respond, he can respond so that we don't lose  
19 time with his contract expiring." That's what  
20 happened.

21 So when we told Mr. Gallagher, he received  
22 the RFQ because special counsel means that you  
23 can be special counsel to anything. You can be  
24 tax counsel, you can be any kind of special  
25 counsel. So that was the reason why we sent it

1 out to save the time from his contract  
2 expiring. That's what actually occurred.

3 And that-- we thought when we were doing  
4 that we were doing a good thing by making sure  
5 that his contract did not expire. It was not  
6 trying to subvert or do anything or to slow  
7 anything down. It was actually to process  
8 something that we didn't want to see expire.  
9 Am I right, Claude? Is that the conversation  
10 that we had?

11 MR. SMITH: That's the conversation that  
12 we had in house definitely.

13 THE CHAIRMAN: Can I talk now, Mike,  
14 please?

15 MR. ARMSTRONG: Yes.

16 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you, sir. All right.  
17 So my-- what I was trying to say was normally  
18 the process that we have been doing is that  
19 once we receive-- receive those RFQs back, that  
20 instead of voting on them in the general  
21 meeting right here, that the personnel  
22 committee reviews and grades those-- those said  
23 RFQs and RFPs, okay. That's the process that I  
24 was aware of.

25 Today you expected us to come in-- and we

1 have new board members-- and vote on contracts  
2 and vote on RFQs that they are newer to this  
3 committee, that they may or may not understand.  
4 That's the point I was getting at.

5 I don't recall the other-- the  
6 conversation that I recall is that you had  
7 brought up that if we are going to do one RFQ  
8 for one solicitor, we should do it for both.  
9 And I agreed with you on that. There was no  
10 argument. So moving forward--

11 MR. ARMSTRONG: I didn't expect for you--  
12 I think you said I expected for you to vote on  
13 it. It's not on my-- it's not on my agenda.  
14 It's on yours. All I did was do what you asked  
15 me to do to put out the RFQs and get the  
16 responses.

17 THE CHAIRMAN: Understood. And I--

18 MR. ARMSTRONG: So I didn't come in here  
19 and expect you to do anything. It's not-- I  
20 didn't put out the-- it's I didn't do anything  
21 for it. You vote on these attorneys, not me.  
22 So I don't know why you are saying I did this.  
23 All I did was what you told me to do.

24 THE CHAIRMAN: Mike, absolutely. But who  
25 put these-- these resolutions on there. I am

1 just trying to clarify--

2 MR. ARMSTRONG: It's your duty though.

3 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you. I know what my  
4 job is. I am pretty good at it. What I am  
5 asking you is moving forward with the personnel  
6 committee, instead of us voting it here, I  
7 didn't even know those RFQs came back prior to  
8 the personnel committee.

9 And it would have been nice if I could  
10 call and speak to a board secretary or maybe  
11 then reach out to me and be proactive and say  
12 hey, the RFQs and RFPs came in. Can we review  
13 them in personnel committee. And I would have  
14 said yes.

15 I didn't know because why? There's no  
16 communication. That's exactly what I said in  
17 the beginning. Fred, continue.

18 MR. BOR: Yes. If I may just to bring  
19 some resolution to this conflict, several years  
20 ago I remember we had an RFQ up. And I think  
21 it was both Mr. Hill and Ms. Bailey saying  
22 well, we don't know who these people are.

23 And one suggestion was just go into closed  
24 session and discuss these things before we vote  
25 it.

1           And the second suggestion, correct me if I  
2           am wrong, Pat, was just take the additional  
3           step that after the RFQ return dates are in, go  
4           to personnel committee, they will make the  
5           recommendations. And then at the next meeting  
6           it is up with the recommendations of personnel.  
7           Am I correct with that, Pat? Wasn't that our  
8           recollection?

9           MS. BAILEY: Yes, we did review them.  
10          Yes, we did. Based on that.

11          MR. BOR: So it is very simple, the  
12          solution. When we have an RFQ and the return  
13          date occurs, the next personnel meeting reviews  
14          them, makes some recommendations. And at the  
15          next regularly scheduled board meeting there's  
16          a vote on it.

17          MR. SMITH: Can I interject for a second?  
18          Because of the fact of the timeline that you  
19          are referencing, the personnel meeting was  
20          actually held on the 3rd which was a Wednesday  
21          if I recall correctly.

22          And these particular requests for  
23          qualifications or proposals came in after that  
24          time period. So based on the timeline that we  
25          are talking about, this would not have actually

1           been presented at the personnel meeting because  
2           of the fact that it is not available for  
3           presentation--

4           THE CHAIRMAN:   Yes, I--

5           MR. SMITH:   But at the same time-- but at  
6           the same time, you know, we were just following  
7           with, you know, with the directives in regards  
8           to what we needed to get done and proceed with  
9           getting these particular packages.

10          Yes, they were not reviewed by the board.  
11          But at the same time we do have it available.  
12          If Mr. Armstrong is-- stands correct is that if  
13          there's a timeline that we have to make a  
14          decision by a certain timeframe to actually go  
15          ahead and make a selection, we have the next  
16          personnel meeting which is coming up next month  
17          in April. And that more than likely is the  
18          first week in April as well too.

19          First-- actually it is going to be more--  
20          it is going to be more like the 7th of April.  
21          So if we need to discuss this further at the  
22          personnel, meeting we can do so.

23          MR. BOR:   So the personnel meeting is  
24          prior to the board meeting in April, right?

25          MR. SMITH:   I beg your pardon? Say that

1           again, Fred.

2           MR. BOR: The personnel meeting is prior  
3           to the board meeting in April.

4           MR. SMITH: That's correct.

5           MR. BOR: That's how it works.

6           THE CHAIRMAN: If there is a timeframe--  
7           if there is a timeframe-- I am saying this to  
8           everyone here and we have a great board here.  
9           If there is a timeline-- I think the last time  
10          it was graded me and Ms. Bailey went over on  
11          our own time and went in there and graded them.

12          Kelley printed up the packets. Kelley  
13          printed all the RFQs, RFPs. And me and her  
14          took our time because we didn't want to violate  
15          any (inaudible) and we sat there and graded  
16          them. So I mean, there is a resolution here.

17          And I really think communication-- reach  
18          out to the chairman or reach out to the  
19          chairman of that committee and we can get this  
20          done cooperatively.

21          MR. BOR: I recall that taking place. So  
22          if we do have a financial exigency as Claude  
23          and Mr. Armstrong are mentioning now, you are  
24          right, Mr. Devlin. I think there was several  
25          times in the past where you reached out to

1 committee members. And the two of you reviewed  
2 it and then made the recommendations.

3 MR. HILL: Just a quick comment. Not to  
4 belabor this, but the procedure is correctly  
5 stated. Just so the new board members know,  
6 just because a committee recommends something  
7 doesn't mean you have to go along with that  
8 recommendation.

9 I generally do listen to most  
10 recommendations, but they are the-- but it goes  
11 to a full board vote. So committees are one  
12 thing then it goes to a full board vote. So  
13 just the be clear on that. Am I correct, Mr.  
14 Bor?

15 MR. BOR: Absolutely, Mr. Hill.

16 MR. HILL: All right.

17 MR. BOR: Can we move on to the next item,  
18 Mr. Devlin?

19 THE CHAIRMAN: Yes, please.

20 MR. BOR: Okay. So B special counsel is  
21 going to be held because of the discussion we  
22 had with Mr. Gonzalez. And it will go to  
23 personnel committee in April for their input.

24 On the solicit bids, Claude, do you want  
25 to review those so we can vote on them?



1 MR. SMITH: Sure. Actually, Nick, if you  
2 want to take the first one I will let you go  
3 ahead and take it. I will back you up on that  
4 one in regards to the utility location and mark  
5 out.

6 MR. MANCUSO: Absolutely. So utility  
7 locating services, guys, this is identifying  
8 water infrastructure throughout Atlantic City.  
9 So it's an essential need. It is something  
10 that we can't stop on.

11 So we temporarily put this out to bid last  
12 year. Actually, we got price quotes last year.  
13 And we have a current company working with us.  
14 But now we are officially putting it out to  
15 bid.

16 So there was a company that was not  
17 interested due to the timeframe. We chose to  
18 push it back a couple months to make sure that  
19 all entities were interested and were willing  
20 to bid. So at this point we are going out for  
21 utility locating services to identify  
22 infrastructure when people call in mark outs.

23 So if you are jackhammering the street and  
24 you open up the road, it's our responsibility  
25 to identify where our infrastructure is so that

1           it's not hit. So that this company does that  
2           for us. It's actually a financial savings  
3           compared to what we used to do internally. So  
4           that's what we are putting out to bid with  
5           utility locating services.

6           MR. SMITH: All right. Thank you.

7           MR. BOR: So is there a motion on C 1?

8           MS. BAILEY: Motion.

9           MR. HILL: Second.

10          MR. BOR: Ms. Bailey.

11          MS. BAILEY: Yes.

12          MR. BOR: Mr. Banfield.

13          MR. BANFIELD: Yes.

14          MR. BOR: Mr. Hill.

15          MR. HILL: Yes.

16          MR. BOR: Ms. Langford.

17          MS. LANGFORD: Yes.

18          MR. BOR: And Mr. Devlin.

19          THE CHAIRMAN: Yes. Thank you.

20          MR. BOR: And now C 2. Clara, Claude or  
21          Nick, who is taking that?

22          MR. SMITH: That's actually for-- actually  
23          for our-- going out for bids for our MTUs.  
24          This is a project that has been in the making  
25          for quite some time that's actually being

1 funded through the state.

2 Actually, we are receiving a loan from the  
3 state to actually put this particular project  
4 out. (Inaudible) specifications are actually  
5 ready. Of course we have to go through the  
6 process as well through the state upon  
7 (inaudible) and accepting this particular--  
8 particular unit that we are actually putting up  
9 for bid.

10 So with that being said, it is something  
11 that we need to get done. And we need to start  
12 working on this as soon as possible.

13 MR. HILL: I would be happy to move C 2.

14 MR. BOR: Is there a second?

15 MS. BAILEY: Second.

16 MR. BOR: Thank you. Ms. Bailey.

17 MS. BAILEY: Yes.

18 MR. BOR: Mr. Banfield.

19 MR. BANFIELD: Yes.

20 MR. BOR: Mr. Hill.

21 MR. HILL: Yes.

22 MR. BOR: Mr. Langford.

23 MS. LANGFORD: Yes.

24 MR. BOR: Mr. Devlin.

25 THE CHAIRMAN: Yes.

1 MR. BOR: And lastly, C 3, water meters.

2 MR. SMITH: Same thing. We are actually  
3 going out for water meters-- well, actually,  
4 replace water meters throughout the city of  
5 Atlantic City for better accountability of  
6 water being utilized by customers.

7 This particular project is also being  
8 financed through New Jersey Infrastructure  
9 Bank. They have actually given us their  
10 approval as well to go out for bids, receive  
11 bids on this. And again, this is similar, we  
12 need this particular project to be done.

13 MR. BOR: Thank you. Is there a motion?

14 THE CHAIRMAN: I will motion that.

15 MR. HILL: Second.

16 MR. BOR: Bailey. Ms. Bailey.

17 MS. BAILEY: Yes.

18 MR. BOR: Mr. Banfield.

19 MR. BANFIELD: Yes.

20 MR. BOR: Mr. Hill.

21 MR. HILL: Yes.

22 MR. BOR: Ms. Langford.

23 MS. LANGFORD: Yes.

24 MR. BOR: And Mr. Devlin.

25 MS. JOHNSON: Excuse me, gentlemen. Mr.

1 LuQua Turner, he was on public participation.  
2 We need to contact him. Did you want to--

3 THE CHAIRMAN: We are in the middle of a  
4 vote right now. We are right in the middle of  
5 a vote. Fred, are you still on roll call?

6 MR. BOR: Yes. We finished the roll call  
7 and--

8 THE CHAIRMAN: I didn't vote.

9 MR. BOR: Oh, I'm sorry. There was a  
10 motion and a second. We will redo the vote.

11 MR. BOR: Ms. Bailey.

12 MS. BAILEY: Yes.

13 MR. BOR: Mr. Banfield.

14 MR. BANFIELD: Yes.

15 MR. BOR: Mr. Hill.

16 MR. HILL: Yes.

17 MR. BOR: Ms. Langford.

18 MS. LANGFORD: Yes.

19 MR. BOR: And Chairman Devlin.

20 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you. Yes.

21 MR. BOR: Okay. You're welcome. We will  
22 move onto monthly bills or do we have a  
23 person-- a public participation person  
24 available? Hearing none is there a--

25 MS. JOHNSON: Yes. Did you want us to

1 contact Mr. LuQua Turner public participant?

2 MR. BOR: And while we are waiting do we  
3 want to make a motion on monthly bills? If the  
4 board has any questions, if not is there a  
5 motion on bills.

6 THE CHAIRMAN: I have a motion the pay  
7 them.

8 MR. BOR: Can I have a second please.

9 MS. BAILEY: Second.

10 MR. BOR: Thank you. Ms. Bailey.

11 MS. BAILEY: Yes.

12 MR. BOR: Mr. Bandfield.

13 MR. BANFIELD: Yes.

14 MR. BOR: Mr. Hill.

15 MR. HILL: Yes.

16 MR. BOR: Ms. Langford.

17 MS. LANGFORD: Yes.

18 MR. BOR: And Chairman Devlin.

19 THE CHAIRMAN: Yes

20 MS. WILLIAMS: You have Mr. Turner on the  
21 line.

22 MR. BOR: Okay. Thank you. And the floor  
23 is yours, Mr. Turner.

24 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay, Mr. Turner. You can  
25 go ahead.

1           MR. TURNER: Good afternoon, everyone. My  
2 name is LuQua Turner. I am the owner of GQ  
3 Maintenance. And we do all the (inaudible)  
4 service over there for the MUA. We have been  
5 there for almost 24 years. My question is, you  
6 had to pay ahead of time and we wanted to know  
7 why weren't we invited to--

8           THE COURT REPORTER: I am having a little  
9 bit of difficulty hearing the speaker.

10          MR. TURNER: Okay. I am calling about the  
11 sanitizing that you had at the MUA. My company  
12 has been with the MUA for almost 24 years. And  
13 I am asking or trying to find out why weren't  
14 we invited to give a price for the sanitizing?  
15 Can you hear me?

16          MR. ARMSTRONG: Yes. Claude, is that--  
17 are you familiar with this, Claude?

18          MR. SMITH: I am familiar with the--

19          MR. TURNER: Hello?

20          MR. SMITH: The disinfecting and  
21 sanitation was actually done at the authority  
22 and--

23          MR. ARMSTRONG: Somebody in--

24          MR. SMITH: Excuse me?

25          MR. ARMSTRONG: You said somebody in house

1 did it?

2 MR. SMITH: No. No, this was not done in  
3 house. This was actually done by a separate  
4 entity which was outside the authority that  
5 actually did the work.

6 MR. ARMSTRONG: Can you just explain to  
7 him what the process was for getting and  
8 obtaining the quotes.

9 MR. SMITH: Well, the recommendation  
10 actually came from the board in regards to the  
11 company that we were looking at in terms of  
12 usage because of their background and because  
13 of their experience.

14 So with that being said, we did do some  
15 work with that particular company in regards to  
16 doing the disinfection at this location. It  
17 was a one-time disinfection that was done here.  
18 And that was it. We have not done any other  
19 disinfection since that time period.

20 And pretty much our in-house disinfection  
21 and cleaning has been what's been ongoing.  
22 Mr. LuQua does have services that he can  
23 actually provide. He did some services prior  
24 to that. And the board did not necessarily  
25 decide to go back with that particular service



1 based on the timeframe and the period that it  
2 was actually being requested for the building  
3 to be sanitized.

4 MR. BOR: Okay.

5 MR. ARMSTRONG: I'm not sure if he heard.  
6 Kelley, can you confirm that he heard.

7 MS. WILLIAMS: Mr. Turner, did you hear  
8 everything?

9 MR. TURNER: I did hear. But you were  
10 talking too soft. If you could speak up a  
11 little louder I could hear you better.

12 MR. ARMSTRONG: Is there any way you can  
13 put the phone closer to where the speaker is?

14 MS. WILLIAMS: This is as far as it goes,  
15 Mr. Armstrong.

16 MR. ARMSTRONG: Is there a phone near the  
17 monitor? Another phone near the monitor, no?

18 MS. WILLIAMS: Can you hear a little  
19 better now, Mr. Turner?

20 MR. TURNER: I can hear a little bit  
21 better now, yes.

22 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay.

23 MS. JOHNSON: Claude, I'm sorry. Can you  
24 repeat that?

25 MR. SMITH: Yes. In regards to the

1 disinfection and sanitation that was actually  
2 done here at the administrative office, of  
3 course, the board was actually involved with  
4 the fact that the company that we were  
5 selecting was a company that qualified and was  
6 doing this particular work probably elsewhere.

7 We looked into that company and the cost  
8 that they had actually provided us. The  
9 sanitation that was actually done here was the  
10 one-time disinfection and sanitation at this  
11 particular location. That was the only time we  
12 had the building sanitized by that particular  
13 company.

14 As per my understanding of Mr. LuQua had  
15 also done some disinfection and sanitation of  
16 the building prior to that time period. But  
17 the board did not go back with that  
18 particular-- I guess it's not even a contract,  
19 but it is actually case services that was being  
20 provided at that time.

21 MR. BOR: Okay. Thank you.

22 MS. WILLIAMS: Did you hear that, Mr.  
23 Turner?

24 MR. TURNER: I heard what Claude said. My  
25 company, we do all the sanitizing for the CRDA,

1 one of the largest state contract companies  
2 around. We do their offices. We do their  
3 warehouses. We do family services, we do all  
4 of their sanitizing. And we do quite a bit of  
5 churches in the area that we sanitize.

6 So when you speak about qualifications,  
7 all you had to do is pick up that phone, Claude  
8 and give me a call. That's all it takes. And  
9 I would give you all the information that you  
10 needed. I gave you the stuff that we were  
11 using, the chemicals that we were using. I  
12 gave all that to you.

13 MR. SMITH: Let me cut you off for a  
14 second there. If I was directed to actually  
15 contact you at that particular time period, I  
16 would have actually done so. I was not given  
17 any directive to actually contact you again in  
18 regards to the disinfection and sanitation that  
19 was actually done prior.

20 And like I said, the company that the  
21 board chose to go with was another company in  
22 terms of doing the disinfection and sanitizing  
23 of the administration building and the  
24 distribution department as well too.

25 MR. TURNER: So my problem is why is it

1           that some of the board members thought that we  
2           were still doing the sanitizing in the  
3           building?

4           MR. SMITH:  If it's directed to me, I  
5           can't answer that particular question in  
6           regards to why some of the board members might  
7           have actually believe or determined that you  
8           were still doing disinfection and sanitation  
9           and sanitizing in the building itself.

10          I mean, if you spoke to a particular board  
11          member and they told you that then I am not  
12          sure who you spoke with.

13          MR. BOR:  Mr. Chairman.

14          THE CHAIRMAN:  Yes, can we move on?  Do we  
15          need a motion to go into executive?

16          MR. BOR:  Yes.  Mr. Devlin, before we just  
17          move on, just briefly, first of all, we do have  
18          a five minute rule for outside comments.

19          But other than that, unless it's been  
20          changed, several month ago I received a DCA  
21          memo that outside comments should be put in the  
22          form of an email directed to the ED.  The ED  
23          would then read the comment to the board and  
24          then after the response, would email back a  
25          response.

1           So this gentleman has been with us a long  
2           time. And I understand the board wanted to  
3           hear from him. But I don't think that's  
4           exactly the right procedure going forward other  
5           than professionals, of course, calling in.

6           Other than that, is there a motion?  
7           Monthly bills has been approved. Is there a  
8           motion to go into executive session?

9           MR. HILL: Motion.

10          THE CHAIRMAN: Second.

11          MR. BOR: Hearing no objection, we will go  
12          into executive session.

18          MR. BOR: So first motion is to approve  
19          the Lake Field settlement that Mr. Armstrong

21          record, I reviewed the release and found that  
22          satisfactory. So is there a motion to approve  
23          the Lake Field settlement?

24          MS. BAILEY: Motion.

25          MR. HILL: I will make a motion to accept.

1 THE CHAIRMAN: Second.

2 MS. BAILEY: I will second Gary's motion.

3 MR. BOR: Ms. Bailey.

4 MS. BAILEY: Yes.

5 MR. BOR: Mr. Banfield.

6 MS. BAILEY: Yes.

7 MR. BOR: Mr. Hill.

8 MR. HILL: Yes.

9 MR. BOR: Ms. Langford.

10 MS. LANGFORD: Yes.

11 MR. BOR: Mr. Devlin.

12 THE CHAIRMAN: Yes.

13 MR. BOR: And I believe, Mr. Chairman, you  
14 had another motion you wanted to address?

15 THE CHAIRMAN: Yes. I believe we wanted  
16 to address a resolution that committee-- the  
17 chairman can take who they want at their said  
18 committees.

19 MR. ARMSTRONG: Employees you mean.

20 MR. BOR: Employees.

21 THE CHAIRMAN: That's correct.

22 MR. BOR: So the motion raised by the  
23 chairman is that committee chairman should have  
24 the ability to select which employees should  
25 attend their meeting to assist in the business

1 and the mission of that particular committee.

2 THE CHAIRMAN: Motion.

3 MR. BOR: Is there a second?

4 MR. HILL: Question, do we need a  
5 resolution for that?

6 MR. BOR: Well, it's going to be a new  
7 policy.

8 MR. HILL: Well, then why don't we wait  
9 until we update the bylaws and the policies?  
10 Or we could just do it. I mean, I don't--  
11 Fred, you're the attorney. Do we need a  
12 resolution for this?

13 MR. BOR: Yes.

14 MR. HILL: Oh, you do. How about the--

15 MR. BOR: We are changing the procedure of  
16 how committees function.

17 MR. HILL: I just want the right people at  
18 my meeting.

19 THE CHAIRMAN: That's what we are trying  
20 to do, Gary.

21 MR. ARMSTRONG: But nobody said, honestly,  
22 that you are not going to get the right people.

23 MR. HILL: I never--

24 MR. ARMSTRONG: That's all I am saying.  
25 Nobody ever said you weren't going to get the

1 right people.

2 THE CHAIRMAN: Fred, moving forward, can  
3 we pass this resolution or not either way?

4 MR. BOR: I haven't heard a second yet.

5 THE CHAIRMAN: I have a motion. I need a  
6 second.

7 MR. HILL: I will second it if it is going  
8 to move this meeting forward and we can get the  
9 right people. We always have the right people.  
10 I never had a problem with that.

11 MR. BOR: Ms. Bailey.

12 MS. BAILEY: Abstain.

13 MR. BOR: Mr. Banfield.

14 MR. BANFIELD: Yes.

15 MR. BOR: Mr. Hill.

16 MR. HILL: Yes.

17 MR. BOR: Ms. Langford.

18 MS. LANGFORD: You know what, I am so  
19 confused.

20 MS. BAILEY: Me too.

21 MS. LANGFORD: And normally I'm not. You  
22 know what, yes, I guess. You know what, it's  
23 long-- it's been a long meeting. But this is--  
24 wait. Let me just ask a question. I know we  
25 are in the middle of a vote and I probably



1 shouldn't ask--

2 THE CHAIRMAN: You can speak during a  
3 motion and a second. You are allowed to speak.

4 MS. LANGFORD: With these committees--  
5 because I am new on personnel. And as you  
6 know, that is a vital-- well, all committees  
7 are vital. But personnel is a very, very  
8 important, vital committee.

9 And as you said, Gary and John and  
10 everyone, having the right tools, having the  
11 right support system-- because there is a lot  
12 of cases.

13 I'm a layperson. I am not going to know.  
14 So I am going to need the supporting cast, so  
15 to speak, in those committees in my decision  
16 making as far as recommending. Because it's  
17 not my decision, it's the boards' decision.

18 MR. HILL: Right.

19 MS. LANGFORD: So as long as that is going  
20 to be the supporting cast that I am going to be  
21 able to have to support me in making those  
22 decisions, it's yay. If it's not that, it's a  
23 nay. So you know--

24 MR. HILL: Right. We want the right  
25 people there.

1 MS. LANGFORD: Right. I need-- I need  
2 that. I need that. So if that's the case and  
3 that is what this is then yes. I just need the  
4 right people along with me.

17 MR. BOR: Okay. So that motion will just  
18 be put on hold.

19 THE CHAIRMAN: I will pull that motion  
20 until next month.

21 MR. HILL: I got to go.

22 MR. ARMSTRONG: But I also believe that,  
23 vice chairman, that this should be something  
24 that's incorporated into your bylaws so that,  
25 as Mr. Dedar said, you need-- they need

1 guidance. They need something that they can go  
2 to so that they can understand and that I can  
3 understand.

4 And that's why I asked for the bylaws in  
5 the beginning. You know, I don't want this  
6 confusion. Part of the confusion is there is  
7 no clarity.

8 MR. BOR: Well, the bylaws we have are  
9 inadequate, as you know, from 2013.

10 MR. ARMSTRONG: That's part of the problem  
11 to be honest with you is that there is no  
12 current bylaws. And it doesn't tell anyone  
13 where their-- what their responsibilities are  
14 and where the line is drawn so that I would  
15 know, Mr. Dedar would know, Mr. Banfield would  
16 know, anyone on the board would know so that we  
17 we don't have these issues in the--

18 MR. BOR: Well, what I could do is I could  
19 reach out to several of our larger MUAs and get  
20 copies of theirs just for informational  
21 purposes. It's online. And see what other  
22 MUAs generally put in their bylaws and then  
23 bring it to the boards' attention.

24 MS. BAILEY: Thank you, Fred.

25 MR. BANFIELD: And I would like to say

1 something. Because I really kind of like spoke  
2 out of term because I really don't even know  
3 what committee I am even on.

4 So someone needs to tell me this. Because  
5 I know somebody said that I was on a committee  
6 that I had no knowledge I was on. So what  
7 committee am I a part of?

8 THE CHAIRMAN: I will get with you very  
9 shortly, Mr. Banfield.

10 MR. BANFIELD: Okay.

11 THE CHAIRMAN: We are still trying to wait  
12 and find out who is going to be alternate and  
13 who is not going to be alternate. We are  
14 waiting.

15 We waited until Thursday. That's why we  
16 rescheduled the meeting for today. It's kind  
17 of in the city counsel's hands. As soon as we  
18 have firm knowledge of that, I will be back  
19 with you directly.

20 MR. BANFIELD: Thank you.

21 MS. JOHNSON: Gentleman, just to let you  
22 know, Gary Hill has dropped off.

23 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

24 MR. BOR: I don't believe there is any  
25 other business, Mr. Chairman.

1 THE CHAIRMAN: Stella, if you are there--

2 MS. JOHNSON: Yes.

3 THE CHAIRMAN: Can you give me a contract  
4 information for the new board members so I can  
5 speak to them regarding committees. Can I have  
6 an updated contract with your information, with  
7 everybody's information please? That would be  
8 great.

9 MS. JOHNSON: You said a contract?

10 THE CHAIRMAN: Contacts.

11 MS. JOHNSON: Contacts. Okay. No  
12 problem.

13 THE CHAIRMAN: Please, cellphones and  
14 emails. And that would be nice. I appreciate  
15 it.

16 MS. JOHNSON: No problem. Okay. And you  
17 gentlemen are aware that Gary Hill is no longer  
18 on.

19 MR. BOR: Yes.

20 THE CHAIRMAN: Correct. All right, Fred.

21 MR. BOR: If there's no business, is there  
22 a motion to adjourn? We are in open session  
23 now. So is there a motion to adjourn the  
24 meeting?

25 THE CHAIRMAN: Motion.

1 MS. BAILEY: Motion.

2 THE CHAIRMAN: Second.

3 MR. BOR: It's 12:53. The meeting is  
4 adjourned. Thank you.
